THE END OF RYDAL

When we joined The Fell Pony Society in 1983, the Spring Performance Trial was described to me as the ultimate test of a Fell Pony within the confines of organised Society events. I knew of several Fells which competed regularly and successfully against other breeds at Pony Club, in Riding Clubs and other "open" competitions, but nowhere other than Rydal had I seen 30 Fells performing what many regard as modern disciplines perhaps not suited to the breed. Believing that the versatility of the Fell was a large part of its attraction, we became regular competitors at Rydal. The location seemed ideal;good parking space, flat areas for dressage and showjumping, and a testing, hilly cross-country course with magnificent views.

This year we had a possible 30 entries for the first time since my involvement in the organisation of the event. Eleven people coming for the first time, all the rosettes bought and arrangements made - and for competitors, holidays booked, dressage tests learned, transport and accommodation for ponies and riders arranged. With entries from Dumfries to Leicester, Workington to Newcastle, it was to be our best year yet! It was with much surprise and regret therefore, that I received the news, 3 days before the event, that Rydal could not be used again. The farm was in the process of changing hands.

My main concern was that a year without a Spring Performance Trial would make it difficult to build up entries again. We determined to run the event at a different venue within a fortnight. Amid all the disappointment for competitors and organisers alike, I was heartened by the telephone calls I The Society should be proud to have members who received. were prepared to build courses on their own land in an attempt to preserve the event. The offer of help from Mr and Mrs Charlton at Linnel Wood, Hexham, proved irresistible however - an established course, used by the local pony club, which could be tailored to meet our needs. Apart from their time and work on the course itself, their provision of stabling and general hospitality, Bob and Sarah returned from holiday for the weekend in question and coped with a family bereavement too. They are keen to hold future events at Hexham, so perhaps the end of Rydal will lead to the trial becoming known as "Linnel Wood". Certainly we will be hard pressed to find a better course.

Details of the event follow:

SPRING PERFORMANCE TRIAL

The event was held for the first time at Linnel Wood, Hexham by kind permission of Mr & Mrs R B Charlton. Twenty-two competitors tackeld an excellent course - 2 non-competitively. There were 15 jumps, 12 with a smaller alternative, a water hazard and timed gate to be negotiated.

ROYAL SHOW 1991

Judge's Notes by Alan Tabelin It was a great privilege to judge this year's Fell Pony classes at the Royal Show and I thought I would make a few observations not only for the possible interest of the exhibitors but also for members who may have their own ideas as to the standards required.

It can never be stated often enough or emphasised too firmly that no matter how experienced the eyes appraising the entries it is, at the end of the day, a personal opinion. Always bearing in mind that it is essential the pony standing at the head of the line, whatever the breed, shall represent the best type of pony being judged whether Fell or any other breed of Mountain and Moorland. It must embody the best qualities and be true to type.

In the senior class at this year's Royal, I was much impressed with "Sleddale Rosemary". It had all the distinctive qualities of the "Sleddale" ponies. I could have found fault, but for me it typified the Fell and I preferred it, on the day, to the other ponies in a strong entry. It may just be my feeling but I find the "Sleddale" very representive of an old-fashioned type of pony, and I like it - but everything else has to be there as well to make it a winner, and for judges the key phrase must always beon the day this is my choice. At another show, on another day, a totally different pony may appeal.

In the second class, for those foaled in 1988 or 1989, "Border Black Lady" stood out and though a youngster, I could not ignore it for the championship. I must confess that we get so used to seeing Mr Bell bringing forward "Waverhead" ponies of super quality that I was surprised to learn that this was not of his breeding. But he undoubtedly has a great eye, born of experience, for this is an outstanding example of a Fell filly and as the "Horse & Hound" correspondent wrote, there was an encouraging entry. Sadly though not for the yearlings, where only two came forward.

As the years go by, it is encouraging to see the Fell Pony remaining true to type. It speaks much for the harmony between north and south and the generosity of breeders in the North that more and more good quality ponies are travelling further afield. I remember judging at the Royal Windsor a few years ago, when H.M. The Queen was among the spectators and she was delighted with the quality of the entry. That is why the Fell Pony Society is in such good heart. Long may it remain so.
