THE LOWNTHWAITE ROB TROPHY presented by the Laing family in 1979, is a very difficult trophy to award, as we have so many ponies now that are really doing great things to promote Fell ponies for the Society. This year it is to be presented to Baldersdale Hero, foaled 1968. Many people will remember seeing Baldersdale Hero, and he is still going strong. He was bred by Mrs Margaret Murray at Baldersdale, near Barnard Castle. He was a stallion for a while and sired some stock before being gelded. His sire was Heltondale Sonny Boy and his dam Kirkland Betty. He has had several owners who have all enjoyed him. In 1975 he was in the Tableau at Lowther Driving Trials at Penrith. He was playing the part of Lingcropper, the stallion that was found on Stainmore. After Lowther that year, he was sold by Mr Eddie Wilson to Mrs Briggs-Bury, who rode him for many years. Now her daughter Mrs Dunning has him in Gloucestershire, where he has given many hours of enjoyment to many different people.

An 'Ode' to the Fell Pony - the following piece was sent in by Fell owner Mrs Sharon Tonkin, Somerset, and is a light-hearted summary of the breed, with which I should imagine most of us can relate a similar experience! It sounds like 'Thelwell' hasn't got a look in and I think that it's brilliant! RB.

"The ripped open envelope revealed Spring 1993 Fell pony magazine, which I eagerly began to read, there it was again, every pony immaculate, prizewinning, taking Olympia by storm, doing charity work, all smiling .......

"It's time," I told my husband, "the naked truth be told". "For all those Fell owners who do not identify with the smiling ones ... the 'Revised Description of the Fell pony' - by one who knows ....."

**Height** Variable depending on mood, 13.2-16.2 hh.

Colour Black, Brown, Bay, Grey, to include as much mud and vegetation,

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bird droppings and straw as possible.

**Head** Containing rather too much brain, well set on tapering to a peppermint locating facility of extreme sensitivity.

Nostrils Able to sneeze and cover rider in dewdrops on demand - range 10'.

**Eyes** Preferably 2, devilish glint to be expected.

Ears Put on backwards, mostly resting flat on head.

Throat & Jaw Streamlined, for easy access to pockets.

**Neck** Long enough for rider to cling to in times of emergency.

**Shoulder** Sloping and laid back to ease ability to flick rider off just before a jump.

Carcase Deep, strong, apparently always empty of food. Hind quarters square and strong to enable support of huge bush tail.

Feet Of enormous size, big enough to leave lunar craters in the lawn.

Mane, Tail, Feather Ability to grow mane to equal length and then cast a section by depositing it in other ponies' mouths. Tail most active when owner picking out hind feet.

**Action** Slow on the way out, showing great pace on way home, especially nearing tea time.

General Character Fell pony shows enormous sense of humour, constitutionally as tough as old boots, having the unmistakable appearance of a clever little beasty, who has his owner just where he wants her; totally besotted.

So that you may see and judge for yourselves, here is a picture of the above described equine. He looks as though butter wouldn't melt in his mouth!! Affectionately known as 'Pluto' - must be the connection with the 'lunar craters'! - but officially known as **HAZLEBADGE MANDRAKE FP197G**, foaled 1983, sire: Gibside Danny Boy, dam: Hazlebadge Nutmeg, bred by Mrs C Grundy.



Quite independently, 'Pluto's' breeder Mrs Caroline Grundy has written in with some

information on her ponies - chiefly about Pluto's dam actually - Hazlebadge Nutmeg 'Meg' - who was recently featured in the magazine Horse & Pony, in connection with their Super Solvitax award. Mrs Grundy writes: "Meg, foaled in 1970 by Waverhead Rob out of Lownthwaite Gazelle, was the first foal I bred from Gazelle, who had 2 more fillies by Rob before being killed by lightning in 1975. All my early successes with Fells were encouraged by Jane Glass, without whom I doubt I would have persevered, with some of the difficulties encountered. Meg herself had four foals, a filly by Adamthwaite Lucky Star, who is now 17 and still lives in this area, 2 fillies by Charlie Drake and a colt by Gibside Danny Boy who is now 10 years old and lives in Somerset (this is of course Pluto). In between this she was shown with some reasonable success, the highlight for me was winning the Fell championship at the Royal under Mr Charlton in 1974. Now an active old lady of 23 years, she recently won the veteran class at a local show and she helps out on occasion in our riding school. She will obviously never leave me and however many more years she has, I think it just shows what a lot of pleasure and different activities you can have with a Fell. I started with Fells in 1966 and from my first pony down to the 4 year old Heltondale Rob now in the yard, have enjoyed them Caroline Grundy. all in different ways.

About 12 Fells and riders/drivers took part in the making of the programme, which was reported by Jessica Holmes, who was so enthralled with the breed having spent a day riding, driving and learning more about the ponies, that she became a member and tells me she would dearly like her own Fell some day. Thanks again to all those who made such a great effort to bring their ponies to Weardale for the day and again to Jan and Adam. Participants on the day were Mr Don Eltringham, with Southwick Beauty and Townend Honour II, Judy Fairburn with Gibside Dolly, David Harle and Hazel Hindmarch with Swindale Rose and Rackwood Rose, Rachel Bell with Marlingdyke Millstream, and the following were some of Jan Ellis's ponies - Sleddale Beauty, Lownthwaite Star Wish, Dalemain Nettle. **RB.** 

MY LONG DISTANCE FELL PONY: We have owned 'Bramble' (registered name Low Green Topsy, by Lownthwaite Stardust out of Low Green Starlight) since a foal. We had just moved to Cumbria and fell in love with the Fell pony, so we asked Jim Bell to look out for one for us. He found Bramble for us at Wigton Sale in 1985.

My son Tim was born in the same year, so he was always sitting on her. She has a brilliant temperament, never flustered, kicked or nipped. She loves being fussed and groomed. When she was three years old we moved to North Yorkshire, due to Steve's job (he's a forester with the Forestry Commission). I broke her in when she was four - a very uncomplicated business, a bit of lunging, got on, and off we went! I hacked her about and generally schooled her. When she was five, I went along with a friend to quite a few EHPS (Endurance Horse and Pony Society) pleasure rides. She enjoyed them as much as I did. Since then she has had a foal by a Polish Arab (my future endurance horse for the longer rides). Members might be interested to note that a TB cross Fell has been picked for the European International team 100 mile Endurance race at Southwell Race-course on 4th September. Her name is Roxthorne Brittania. This year, with my youngest at play-school, I have been able to get her fitter and do some competitive rides. The first thing I discovered when doing pleasure rides is that she needed clipping - a high trace clip in February - heat affects her most of all. I progress her onto racehorse cubes, oats and competition mix, alfalfa and garlic as she gets fitter and the competitions become more frequent. I always feed her garlic, horsehage and had her on shavings since a hay allergy last year left her gasping. The other important aspect is to keep her slim. We haven't lush grass but she's only allowed 2 x 3 hour blocks of grazing in the 24 hours, with a small feed of alfalfa in between to keep her gut working (I don't feed horsehage in the summer).

By May she's doing 20-25 mile competitive, training or pleasure rides every Sunday. The terrain varies from rock climbing up at Stokesley, bog hopping on the moors, endless cantering on the wolds and forestry, so she has to be adaptable. In the week I don't ride her every day, so as to keep her sweet, I vary it with schooling, steady hacking with hill work, lunging and interval training. After a competition I give her a day or two off.

As you can see from the photo, I do use specialist tack and have found it has made a tremendous difference to her on a long ride. The bridle is a combination one, basically a headcollar with the bit and reins clipped on afterwards -it makes it easier for vetting and saves time and cleaning. The saddle is made by Keith Bryan of Walsall. It has no extended fans which I felt would be too long for her but it has very broad panels t distribute the weight, and the gullet is wide for the benefit of her spine. It is quite straight cut, which allows for maximum freedom of the shoulders. It is also extremely comfortable for my bottom which means that I get less fatigued and so ride more balanced for the pony's benefit. I also use flexi-stirrups. They 'give' slightly as you move up and down so that you feel as if you are riding on air. I get no problem with aching knees or ankles and with a broad piece for your foot to sit on, they are very comfortable and safe.

Before a long ride, I always wash Bramble with an insecticide shampoo to get rid of the grease, so that when I pour a slosh bottle over her to cool her, it doesn't run off her like a duck (as happened the first time!). The lack of grease also helps to keep her cooler.

Her long distance companion is a 14.1 half TB quarter Arab. They get on very well despite their difference in breeding. Bramble helps keep Gem going on the trotting sections, which she does very fast (locally known as 'turbo') over any terrain, up or down hill. Gem being half TB is a better canterer and has helped Bramble improve her cantering stamina considerably. She will now keep it up for five miles, more or less continually on good going like the wolds.

We have completed 14 rides so far this year, three of them 25 mile competitive trail rides. At Wyekham Forest we got a 'completion' - it was wet and heavy going- Sledmere a grade 4, on a fast endless cantering ride on the wolds and a grade 3 on a fast cantering ride at Laughton, Scunthorpe, which is where the picture was taken. On this ride we did 20 miles at 10 mph and had to walk more or less all the way home to avoid being eliminated for going too fast. For Novice CTR you must complete the ride at an average between 6 and 7 mph and pass the vet for lameness, heart rate and lumps and bumps. I am aiming to try and get her heart rate down as much as possible through fitness. The lowest she has gone out is 40. The parameter is usually 38 at the rides which makes getting a grade one very difficult. Bramble usually vets out at about 4 beats higher than when she started.

At the vetting, Bramble always looks very alert and relaxed but once she's got going and warmed up she's raring to go. Once we've completed the compulsory 10 novice rides, I aim to mover her up to the Open section, which entails riding at an average speed of 7-8mph over 25-40 miles.

None of this would be possible of course without a brilliant crew which consists of my husband Steve and our three boys, Tim, Colin and Michael. They are always waiting at every possible place on route, with slosh bottles for cooling the ponies necks and shoulders and encouraging them to drink as much as possible - as well as the riders!

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If you enjoy following a route on a map, markers on the course, meeting new friends and riding in all different parts of your country or country, along bridleways and tracks then have a go. We get plenty of compliments as we ride along, due to Bramble of course, not me!

MANAGEMENT, with the present parts (d) to (g) becoming (e) to (h). The proposed addition is shown in **bold type**:

- (a) The management of the affairs of the Society shall be conducted by a Council.
- (b) The Council shall consist of 20 of the Members of the Society.
- (c) Four Members of the Council shall retire each year but shall be eligible for immediate re-election at the A.G.M. without further nomination.
- (d) Nominations for election to the Council must have been a fully paid up Member of the Society for a minimum of 5 years.
- (e) Nominations for the Council shall be in writing, signed by two members and forwarded to the Secretary at least 8 weeks before the date of the A.G.M.
- (f) Election to the Council shall be by secret ballot.
- (g) The quorum for a Council Meeting shall be seven members of the Council. The Chairman of the Meeting shall only have a casting vote.
- (h) The Council shall have power to make or amend regulations regarding the Stallion Show and Premiums, the Breed Shows, Registrations and the Annual Sale and the distribution of awards.
