HANDY HINTS FOR 'BEST TURNED OUT' CLASS - The Briar Trophy, presented by Mrs Marshall, is a Championship Cup awarded at the Breed Show to the Best Turned Out Pony and Rider. Unlike the other championship cups, the competition for this one could be anybody's guess. You do not have to be a superstar or a millionaire! Just a rider who has spent time, effort and thought on their overall turn-out. To quote from the catalogue, the Judges are looking for riders who "are 13"

turned out neatly, correctly and safely"; and ponies who have "well-fitting, safe and well-cared for tack". For those who are new to showing, or want to become more professional, here are some guide-lines.

#### The Rider:

- 1. Jacket coloured, black or tweed is your choice. It should be well-fitting and buttoned-up while riding.
- 2. Always wear gloves. If you need to carry a whip, use a show cane, that is a short leather-covered stick of not more than 30".
- 3. Wear a white <u>shirt</u> (not blouse) with neck button fastened. The tie, with a neat knot, centrally placed, should have the ends securely pinned.
- 4. Cream or white jodhpurs/breeches, are set off by clean, well-polished long, or jodhpur boots. Spurs are optional but if you wear them, choose small, blunt-ended ones and make sure you know how to use them correctly!
- 5. The Hat whilst show hats without chin-straps are very stylish, a well-fitting, velvet or silk-covered skull cap (BSI standard!) with a correctly fitted chin-strap, is by far the most sensible wear and will get the judges' firm approval.
- 6. Make sure your hair is neat and tidy. If it is long, it could be tied back but for female riders all hair is better confined in a hair-net.

### The Pony's Tack:

- 1. The leather should be well cleaned and soft, which will greatly increase your pony's comfort.
- 2. It should all be in good repair no loose stitching or worn buckles.
- 3. The saddle, correctly placed on the pony's back, should fit both the pony and the rider.
- 4. Stirrups should fit the riders feet- either too small or too large can be dangerous.
- 5. Make sure the girth lies flat and smooth in the correct place just behind the pony's elbow. Of course; it should be clean and soft.
- 6. The bridle should be correctly fitted, particular attention being paid to the bit, which should be the right width and placed correctly in the mouth.

Your pony will appreciate these small attentions to detail and if he is comfortable, may be a more amenable and willing ride. Safety is always important and frequent tack checks can help to eliminate unnecessary accidents.

A well-turned out horse and rider presents a happy, confident and business-like picture and in the show ring, will always draw the judges' eye.

# Whilst on the subject of tidiness - Litter!

Last year the litter on the field at Dalemain, after the Stallion Show was especially bad. In particular, our 2 main shows, the Stallion Show and the Breed Show are held by invitation and we are fortunate to have such lovely venues. Surely, out of respect to our hosts, at the end of the day, the fields should be left as we find them, 'green and clean'. Most members are careful and caring but as always it is the few who give the whole a bad impression. Alright, someone usually stays and picks up the litter, but it is such an unnecessary job, when, with a little extra thought all members could take their litter home and thus show courtesy to our hosts.

## LONG DISTANCE DRIVING - Part II

This is a new non-competitive driving discipline. The British Driving Society Long Distance Driving Committee organise events either as Bronze or Silver Awards. All participants must be B.D.S. members.

A Bronze Drive takes place over a measured 40 kilometre (25 miles) course and is divided into two 20 kilometre sections with a compulsory 45 minute halt and inspection at halfway. Most events are organised in a figure eight

with the Start, Half-way halt and Finish at the centre of the 'eight'. This makes things easier for organisers, vets, farriers, harness inspectors and participants.

The aim is to present a challenge to the driver, to demonstrate the fitness of his/her horse or pony and his/her ability to drive that animal at a given speed over a 40 kilometre course of varied terrain. At the end of the drive the horse or pony should still be capable of continuing a further few miles without distress. The course should be enjoyable both to the humans and the animals taking part!

To gain an award the participant has to complete the drive and the various inspections without penalty points. Prior to Section A, is the veterinary inspection for soundness and initial pulse rates, which must be below 56 per minute. There is also a farriery inspection, harness and vehicle inspection for soundness, suitability and the listed safety spares, including first aid kit for humans/horses must be carried. Pneumatic tyred vehicles are not allowed. There is a permitted time for each 20 kilometre section, with a 10 minute difference between maximum and minimum time allowed.

Fell Ponies come into Class 2 - 12.2 - 14.2 hh. Speed 10 kph, maximum time 120, minimum time 110 minutes. At the half-way halt, after 25 minutes rest, ponies are vetted again for pulse rate, dehydration skin pinch test and fitness to continue. Harness and vehicle are also inspected.

Section B commences 45 minutes after the end of Section A - same time allowances. At the end of this section horses/ponies rest for 30 minutes and are again vetted. Pulse rates above 56 incur penalties, and for those above 64, elimination.

Prior to the event, participants receive their start and inspection times, maps and route directions. Routes are marked with directional arrows and kilometre markers.

Grooms are responsible for navigation and must be good time-keepers, marking off each kilometre flag and recording times - not an easy task when the trap is swaying across fields and along dirt tracks!

Until this year (1992), all Drives have been for Bronze Awards, as to qualify for entry to Silver Award, the participants must have three Bronzes from different venues, all awarded to the same horse/pony. It is not financially viable for these events to have less than twenty participants. At the end of each event, all those who have completed the course are awarded a Completion rosette, grooms receive a rosette and the successful 'no penalty' participants sign the B.D.S. area commissioner application form and await the arrival of the postman, with their award certificate and Bronze Wheel badge.

Silver Award Drives cover a course of 60 kilometres (approx. 37.5 miles), with 40 kilometres driven on one day, the further 20 kilometres driven over a different course on the following day. Inspections, etc., as before. **D Billings**


