The intention is to provide courses challenging enough for the experienced and sufficiently encouraging for the less experienced or novice combinations. This year we hope to include a Novice class.

BORDER RIDE HOLIDAY

Having read about the Border Trail Ride in my local B.H.S. newsletter, a friend, Barbara Dunne, and I decided that it would make an ideal holiday. I discovered that Rachel and a friend of hers were also considering trying it out. We decided to join forces and, taking a week in mid-June, the four of us set out on three Fell Ponies and a Morgan horse.

The Border Trail ride has a circular route of about 100 miles. It is based on Kielder Forest, where it starts and ends, and the trail, following wherever possible bridle paths and tracks goes north-east through the Northumbrian country-side before turning north into the Cheviots and finally turning south into the forest. The Ride provides a set of instructions which we used with O.S. maps, but the route is well marked and easy to

follow. One makes one's own arrangements for accommodation and part of the feeling of adventure was the variety of the people and the places providing our Bed and Breakfasts. All were kind and helpful in their various ways, but all so very different!

Each day's riding brought it's own pleasures, with new views of the countryside and differing terrain to ride through. The first and last days, riding in the forest, were the least interesting as one tree looks very like another and the tracks were, in places, quite stoney. On our third day the route took us up the Coquet Valley on bridlepaths, small roads and tracks and from there, up into the hills.



On one of the 'hot' days - admiring the view after steep climbing on route to one of the ancient Roman camps, above 'Blindburn', Harbottle. Being unappreciative of the need to take photographs, Major, Gypsy and Prince wonder why they have to stand still - but Gypsy takes the opportunity to use Prince as a nice scratching post. Typical Fell Pony really!

Despite the rain, it was a lovely ride. We passed the ruins of Harbottle Castle, standing up on it's crag, half-hidden in the mist and shortly afterwards were riding up into the Cheviots on Clennel Street - a very old drove road. As we saw not a soul throughout the day, there was a timeless feel about it all and with very little effort we could imagine that we were travelling in another age. Of course, the ponies went a long way in helping to create that illusion - I have been on several "long distance" holidays, on different types of horses, but I can truly say that a holiday with a Fell is the best! Safe and dependable over all kinds of ground but not averse to showing a fair turn of speed occasionally and good companions throughout. Our three Fells were Waverhead Gypsy, 16

De Brus Prince and Marlingdyke Millstream (Major). Prince was last minute substitute as Barbara's other pony Twislehope Warrior was lame. But despite being less fit than the other two, Prince coped well and became noticeably fitter as the time passed. The next two days' routes were all in the Cheviots. We had wonderful rides on grassy bridleways and the views all around us were superb. It was with reluctance that we returned to the forest on the evening of the 5th day. The worst thing about the forest was the midges. Real blood-sucking little monsters, who seemed immune to even jungle strength repellents. We all suffered but the ponies most of all, as the midges never seemed to take time off and appeared to be hard at it all night long, giving them little rest.

Despite this one shared bad memory, altogether we did have a thoroughly enjoyable holiday. In an exhausting sort of way, it was very relaxing! Spending all day with one's pony is something none of us normally can do but relationships we each built with our ponies was, perhaps, the thing we all appreciated the most. I would recommend such a holiday to anyone.

LOOKING BACK AND AHEAD WITH BRAMBLE Last season Bramble was beginning to excel herself and come into her own. She completed 350 miles, 200 of them being Open Competitive trail rides. At The Spirit of Sherwood four day competitive ride, on day one she helped the North Yorkshire Team of four horses and riders in a 100 mile relay race (each horse had to complete and be vetted over a 25 mile course, the bib was the baton) to come 9th out of 15 teams against a lot bigger horses. She then did another 50 miles in the next three days, she had a rest day in between and I can honestly say she went faster and more fluently on the last day than the first. We unfortunatley only passed the vet for 50 miles due to a high heart rate. She had had an unusually highheart rate for all four days. The vet could only presume it was stress, being away from home. Clipping her every three weeks all summer had definitely helped her to keep cool at the faster paces and to cool down at the end to achieve a better grade. She used to get a dead period at about 18 miles but since clipping it has stopped and she can keep a constant pace of about 9 mph, to walk in at the end, with an average speed of 8 mph gaining a grade three. In fact she's gone better since keeping up a fast pace all the way round rather than starting and stopping for a walking rest. She prefers to keep going! In conjunction with this, her self-confidence and competitive spirit has blossomed. She hates anybody passing no matter how big they are!

I changed her feed last year with a great difference to her performance and body shape. She is well muscled but not so massive in size and very hard. Because of her dust allergy I feed haylage but being unable to get through a bag of horsehage before it goes off in the summer, I rely on Dengie Hi Fi totally for her roughage, plus a couple of hours poor grazing till July, when it is increased to 4

hours a day. I feed her Dodson and Horrell Microfeed. It is very high energy and palatable for endurance work so you don't have to feed vast quantities. By the time she's getting fit, she is eating 8lbs of Hi Fi, 8lbs of Microfeed, 2 tablespoons of competitive supplement (I use Osmonds but don't give as much as the recommended amount because of the Microfeed). I mix the ration for the day in a large bucket, then spread it out over four feeds - it's more accurate than making up individual feeds. On the morning of the ride I add a tablespoon of electrolyte powder to her feed to help her cope with the loss of bodysalts and another tablespoon at the end of the day. If you can, get your pony to drink it dissolved in water - but Bramble won't! The other important part of our team is my trusty crew - Steve and boys. They are there at every opportunity to give us a drink and wash Bramble down and get the rugs, drinking and washing down water ready for when I get back. Steve takes over Bramble, washes her down until she cools, then rugs her up with a warm sweat rug (unless it's boiling hot, when he uses a cotton one). People underestimate how warm a pony needs to be when they have worked hard and are then cooled down with cold water. A point to note here is to only wash the pony's neck, belly and between the back legs where the large blood vessels are. Never on top of the quarters or over large muscles, as you risk causing serious damage to your pony. Steve then offers her a drink, a quiet walk round, another drink and so on till vetting time. Just before she goes before the vet I take her heart rate so that I know what it is.



BRAMBLE ON A 28 MILE RIDE, SEPTEMBER 1994

The culmination of last season came at our groups AGM when Bramble achieved her 500 mile accumulative mileage rosette, Highest Mileage Native type pony Ridden by an Adult, and to my great surprise and pride, she came 5th out of the Top Ten horses in North Yorkshire. She was surrounded by Arabs and Thoroughbreds and their crosses. She finished the season very sound, with her only vet penalties being for heart rate. Unfortunately cobs do have a higher natural heart rate than finer built horses - but we are still hoping for the elusive grade one some day. We are up to grade two. Bramble has now had 3 months complete break and looks very hairy again! She will start her walking work after Christmas, aiming for her first competitive ride at the end of March and if all goes well, a 40 miler at the end of the season. I really enjoy riding Bramble at all these events and gained quite a fan club with other riders' crews coming up after an event to say what a bonny pony she is!

MERES JUDY GILL On a summer's day in June 1994, our four year old mare Lowmoat Judy III with a week old foal at foot was so badly injured by a hit and run vehicle speeding through an access roadway that she had to be humanely destroyed. She had severe multiple fractures of the offside

shoulder and leg. We were left with a little filly foal to hand rear with the grim task of two hourly feeds day and night for the next six weeks, followed by four hourly feeds.

The foal was not the easiest to bucket feed, taking only a few ounces and was very fretful. Having hand reared several foals over the last thirty years I knew the problems ahead. I decided to contact the National Foaling Bank, little thinking I would have any success. But they were most helpful offeringme the only mare in the country on that night and as luck would have it, it turned out to be a Fell mare from Wakefield, Yorkshire, belonging to the Gill family, who had lost her foal a day before. Being dairy farmers there was no way we could get the foal up to Yorkshire and back in a day. The Gill's were so helpful suggesting their son-in-law in Portsmouth bring the foal up the following day. This was all arranged at 11 pm the night before. They arrived before 7 am and with a deep straw bed and two thermos flasks full of milk replacer and glucose they set off on their journey. Luckily the Gill's had kept the dead foal, which they skinned in preparation for the orphan. The mare accepted the foal immediately, the long journey up north had not been in vain.

The foal now named Meres Judy Gill after her adopted family grew in leaps and bounds enjoying her summer in Yorkshire. We decided to go up to the Breed Sale in October and return home with her. She had changed so much from the tiny week old foal to a well grown youngster, looking a lot like her late mother. We bid farewell to the Gills and set off for an horrific journey home in blinding rain and two tyre blowouts on the motorway, arriving home at 9.30 pm!

Judy was so exhausted we almost had to carry her out of the trailer into her box! However, a week later our NPS area held a foal show in Sussex, so we thought it would give Judy a taste of shows. She ended up coming 2nd to Mrs Campbell in the WHP foal class and 3rd in the larger M&M, both classes having 10-12 entries - not bad for an orphan's first outing. She has settled and grown so well in the last four months. A super foal thanks to the kindness of the Gill family in Wakefield and their foster mare.

NEW DRIVING DISCIPLINE - Called 'Hoof Miles' it is run rather like the breed point scheme, one clocks up miles either in Long Distance Driving (LDD) or non-competitive drives over 15 to 25 miles. The organisers of each drive plan a route, issues simple maps, puts out just a few markers - you can have a mid-way break for rest and refreshments - vets are not needed. There are no time limits for the drive, so there is no hassle, which has put quite a few driving folks off LDD's.

You just need a fit animal, a safe carriage, harness, etc., carry the usual spares, all things that conscientious drivers and riders ought to do. Already there are six Hoof Miles planned up and down the country and more will be notified in the B.D.S. newsletter in February and Carriage Driving magazine. It's the sort of thing that should appeal to Fell drivers, without the pressure of hard and fast rules. 
