

Judges are not always blameless; some make unnecessary remarks to exhibitors, unsolicited. Least said, soonest mended, unless asked for considered opinion outside the ring, after the judging. It is also asking for trouble to accept to judge at more than three shows in one area in the same season.

Please let us go back to the good old days when showing was fun and helped us to produce a good pony in good form, better than anyone else's - sometimes!

Secretary's Letter

The year has been dominated by two major hindrances to the breed, namely the Foal Syndrome and EU law introducing compulsory equine passports for all registered horses and ponies born after 1 January 1998.

The Society is extremely fortunate to have the support and expertise of Dr Derek Knottenbelt and his team from Liverpool University Veterinary College at Leahurst researching the evidence of foal mortality, the results and full implications of which are as yet unknown, despite mounting speculation. Whatever they are, we will be able to take comfort in the fact that we have available to us one of the world's leading authorities in the field, and whatever he can do to help us safeguard the breed in future he will surely do.

However, the replacement of existing registration certificates with passports for registered ponies is a greater threat to the future of the breed, as it affects all ponies, if breeders chose not to register their foals as a result. All the Native Pony Breed Societies and the NPS are agreed that the legislation, which is being justified on grounds of encouraging free trade between EU Member States, as it stands is discriminatory as any unregistered equine born in this country after 1 January is not required in law to have a passport. In most European countries, all horses and ponies are required to have passports, and enforcement does happen - if stopped on the way to a show and the passport is not produced on demand, it means going back home.

Breed Societies rightly fear the dessimation of their stud books, which in our own case goes back to 1898. This would be a catastrophe in terms of our National Heritage and must not be allowed to happen.

The consultation exercise with interested parties by MAFF continues and the final Approved Order will be released on 22 December, within 2 weeks of the New Year. There is still a long way to go before the real cost of this exercise to the Society will be known, in terms of computer programming, additional equipment, new stationery and production costs. However, the intention is to comply whilst minimising expenditure, which is in everyone's interests. Revised registration application forms and guidance notes for completion will be needed in due course. Members will be advised as soon as information is available.

Finally, some of you will already have seen the new, limited edition figurine of the Fell Pony Stallion produced by Anne Butler on display at events over the summer. It has been well researched and reaction from Fell enthusiasts has been very good to date. Anne Butler has kindly offered to pay a commission to the Society for each figurine ordered through it, in return for publicity. To the buyer the price is the same regardless of where the order is placed, and delivery is direct to you from the company. So, please, if you wish to order one, do so through me so you can support the Society in its work at the same time. Thank you.

Obituaries

Sarge Noble, who has died aged 73, was involved with Fell ponies all his life.

He and his late brother Thomas kept one of the last semi-feral herd of ponies in Britain. They also bred Galloway cattle and Rough Fell sheep, using their Fell ponies for shepherding.

William Sargeant Noble, known as Sarge, was born on May 23 1923 at Moora Hill Farm, in the valley below Keld Head in Heltondale, Penrith. The Nobles had bred ponies in Cumbria for 200 years, and first registered the stud, prefix Heltondale, in the 1930s. Sarge's father Thomas died in 1949. In 1961 Sarge, his brother and his mother Annie moved to the adjoining High House, Butterwick, retaining the land at both places.

The combined land totalled only 100 acres, but with it went grazing rights for sheep, cattle and horses over a vast area of common land. This stretched from Ullswater and Windermere in the west to embrace Haweswater, Kentmere and Sleddale Fell, and Askham and Brampton Commons.

Here Noble's ponies lived on the fell in winter and summer alike. A mare which had not been rounded up for some time might appear accompanied not only by a foal at foot, but also by a yearling and possibly even a two-year-old.

This natural regime was ordered by Noble mainly through the stallions he selected. Most were home-bred, one exception being the outstanding stallion Tebay Campbell Ton Victor. Otherwise new blood was introduced by the occasional filly that Noble really liked - in which case he was not one to be put off by the price. All

Heltondale stock was marked with a punch hole in the right ear, and straight dock cut across the tip of the tail.

Although Noble increased pony numbers, he regarded them originally as a hobby, with cattle and Rough Fell sheep providing the bread and butter. The Galloway cows were run with a Whitebred Shorthorn to produce very saleable Blue-Grey.

Heltondale Fell ponies were rounded up each autumn for the Wigton horse sales. Sarge and Thomas gathering horses made a remarkable sight: they were master riders over some of the roughest country imaginable, and their ponies were as keen as mustard to behave like sheepdogs as they rounded up the stragglers.

Until the 1950s it was not customary to winter-feed stock on the fells. When the sheep farmers began to feed hay, the ponies stole it. To avoid this, and to help neighbourly relations, the Nobles started feeding the ponies with hay at roughly the same time each day.

As winter approaches, fell farmers become as concerned about the weather as any ship's master. "The ponies have come down," Noble would note as the herd appeared over the skyline; later winter would break with a vengeance, on the northern fells. Gales, blizzards, driving rain, mists and frosts alternated, but the thick coats and long manes and tails of the ponies helped them to withstand any weather.

Their grazing area was hunted by the Ullswater Foxhounds, principally mountain country which must be hunted on foot; it adjoins John Peel's pack, the Blencathra to the west. Noble was interested in the hounds as controllers of lamb-worrying foxes, and had all the fell man's enthusiasm for hunt suppers and dances.

His ponies were mainly blacks or browns, with just a few greys or bays, yet he knew every one, even those he had sold as foals years before. A fellow breeder bought a 10-year-old stallion to save him from the meat man. Noble immediately pointed out that the registration papers were incorrect - he had recognised him as one he had bred but not seen since his foal days.

His own ponies were smaller than the modern show type, average 13 or 13.1 hands. Yet they have considerably influenced other winning studs; at last year's Royal Show five winning Fells contained Heltondale blood. Heltondale Crown was sold to Holland to become champion pony, all breeds, at a big show.

In the early days many of his strain crossed the Pennines to work in drift mines along the north-east coast. Little outside blood had been brought into the Fells since Tudor times - apart from some Galloway ponies and a few other regional breeds brought home to the north by raiding parties.

Every day during foaling time Noble would ride the mountains. He knew which part was favoured by any particular mare, and if one was missing would always know where to look.

When the Second World War ended, the Fell Pony Society embarked on a breeding scheme on 100 acres of well fenced and watered land, with a large number of mares and one selected stallion.

In 1948 Heltondale Roamer was used; he had been on the fells above Heltondale (1,000 feet) during the terrible winter of 1947, proving the hardiness of the Fell breed. After selling 100 ponies in 1995, Noble kept a few for showing. He

remained a cornerstone of the breed. A quiet and completely dedicated stockman, he went out of his was to help if asked. He said that if he had to the chance to live his life over he would want it to be exactly the same.

He was for many years on the judges panel, and was well known by Fell pony breeders throughout Britain, Holland and Germany having exported several Heltondale stock to the Continent.

He married, in 1970, Greta Preston.

COUNCIL INFORMATION

RESULTS OF COUNCIL ELECTIONS 1997

At the Society's AGM on 22 March, 8 candidates stood for election to Council, of which 3 were retiring members seeking re-election; there were 4 vacancies. The retiring members were re-elected and were namely Mrs E A Ball, Miss M G Longsdon and Mr R B Sutcliffe. Mr J Bell was the successful new appointment who has filled the fourth vacancy. Mrs M C M Laing was re-appointed as President for a further year's term.

At the first Council meeting of the new Council held on 13 May 1997, in accordance with paragraph 9.2 of the Society's Memorandum & Articles of Association, Mrs E A Ball was voted in as Chairman and Mr B M Allen as Vice-Chairman, both of which were re-appointments and unopposed.

Nominations for the 1998 election at the Spring AGM must be forwarded in writing to the Secretary on or by 1st January 1998 and must be signed by two Full or Honorary Members. Family Members and Junior Members are not eligible to nominate candidates or to vote.

HORSERACE BETTING LEVY BOARD GRANT 1997/98 (redistributed by the National Pony Society)

As expected, this year's grant was down from £3,500 in 1996/97 to £3,220, a reduction of 8%. As income continues to fall, the Board has undertaken a review of how their resources can most effectively be used in the short term. To this end, grant aid to Native Breed Societies not recognised by the Rare Breeds Survival Trust will be phased out in two years' time, those breeds being recognised and retained being the Dales, Exmoor and Fell. No increase in grant is likely over the next two years and what happens thereafter is not known.

The grant money this Society receives is vital to fund Premiums, subsidise stallion licensing and pay for blood typing, for example, which are amongst the defined expenditure criteria laid down by the HBLB. The Society has limited working capital at its disposal, despite some recent increases in fees, and the grant would be a great loss if it should be discontinued.

NATIONAL PONY SOCIETY

At the AGM news of the NPS's move to reduce the number of Native Breed Society representatives eligible to attend Council meetings to two in total, as opposed to one per Society as occurs currently, was greeted with dismay and concern by all. It was the meeting's wish that individual members, as well as the Secretary on behalf of the FPS, must write to the NPS to voice opposition to the proposed changes which will relegate the position of the Native Breed Societies. After consulting with other Native Breed Societies, a joint letter was sent by the Secretary under the name of this Society, the Shetland Studbook Society and the New Forest Pony & Cattle Breeding Society. Other Breed Societies have written independently.

A meeting of NPS representatives due to take place in June was cancelled at short notice and a new date is awaited. However, any changes which the NPS is seeking to bring in will be voted on at their AGM. Unless members attend that meeting, they will not have the opportunity to influence the final decision. The Council of this Society therefore urges any NPS members to attend the AGM if at all possible.

FREE BLOOD-TYPING KITS

20 kits were allocated this year from grant money, as is customary, for use on senior licensed stallions, dams of senior licensed stallions and approved breeding mares; they may also be used on the dams of foals which are recognised to have died the symptoms associated with the Foal Syndrome. Contact the Secretary if you wish to apply for one.

"AT HOME" PREMIUM AWARDS

Only licensed and blood typed stallions siring more than 6 foals registered in the year following the stallion's participation in the "At Home" Premium Class at the Stallion & Colt Show will be considered eligible for a premium. The highest scoring 6 stallions will be awarded the £50 premium, funded from the HBLB grant.

CHANGE TO EXPORT REQUIREMENTS

Due to increasing numbers of ponies being exported, particularly into Europe, problems of ponies turning up with the wrong papers, or having been separated from their papers, have reached intolerable levels. It is particularly cases where several ponies, invariably black and without distinguishing marks, are being exported together, often by dealers, that the confusion occurs. The Society requires all registered ponies other than geldings to be blood typed prior to export, which is invaluable in verifying any parentage queries, however, to the eventual purchaser it is not an instant check against any accompanying documentation.

It has therefore been agreed that microchipping during the pre-export veterinary examination, as well as blood typing, must be carried out so instant verification at delivery, shows, etc. can be done. The cost of microchipping, approximately £25.00, should be borne by the purchaser and the microchip number must be advised to the Secretary so it can be included in the Society's computer record and on the registration certificate.

BLOOD TYPING OF FOALS AT REGISTRATION

On 27 August 1996 the Council voted by 10 votes to 2 with 6 abstentions on a proposal put forward by the Chairman that "All foals be identified on the mother, by any method", with the proviso that this be in motion by 1998.

At each Council meeting the subject of identification arises, and it was discussed at the Spring AGM once again. However, the fact remains that as Council has failed to reach agreement on adopting any particular method of compulsory identification to be incorporated with the registration requirements of foals, the deadlock continues. It now seems that until the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries & Food (MAFF) brings out clear cut guidance on the issue of Equine Passports in line with Commission Decision 93/623/EEC, which reaches its due date on 1 January 1998, the matter will not be furthered.

Many members who voted in favour of blood typing have expressed anger at what is seen as the Council's failure to carry out the wish of the majority of its membership, clouding the issue with the subject of Passports, the latter being an external requirement imposed by Europe. Those Council Members who do support blood typing have been trying hard to resolve the difficulties within the Council for some time.

At the meeting on 13 May 1997 the Chairman proposed a vote that the Society start to encourage breeders to blood type foals on a voluntary basis at registration. Blood samples can be converted to DNA in future if need be. The Society is committed to blood typing which gives any new owner a guarantee of what he or she is buying, and is the surest way of securing your animal's identity for life. Additionally, the bank of data accumulating at the Animal Health Trust in Newmarket could hold the key to the past, the present and the future of this ancient and much loved breed, which, worryingly, is now widely known to be suffering from

the Foal Syndrome, which has major implications for the whole future of the breed, like it or not.

The Society cannot afford to subsidise the cost of blood typing of foals; the kits it sells through the Secretary are sold at cost price. It can only encourage breeders to act responsibly and to follow voluntarily what they wanted introduced when they took the vote. The breeders and owners of today are only temporary custodians of this part of our National Heritage, the Fell Pony; it is our responsibility to ensure future generations can enjoy what may be taken for granted today. If you want to buy a kit, please send £40 to the Secretary who will send one out to you.

FOAL MORTALITY RESEARCH

Over the summer there have been increased numbers of reports of sickly and dead foals from breeders who realise their foals may have succumbed to Syndrome-related symptoms. This increase does not necessarily reflect an increase in incidence; it may be largely as a result of the wider knowledge amongst breeders, owners and vets with regard to the problem. However, few *live*, sick foals were able to reach Leahurst in time, the problem of distance largely being to blame. Some foals have been taken to Penrith and Edinburgh for examination. Dr Derek Knottenbelt has received many calls from concerned breeders and has been much heartened by the willingness of members to help him in his research. However, despite rumours circulating about the possible causes of the Syndrome, Dr Knottenbelt has yet to announce whether the breed is suffering from a serious problem for certain, and if so, what he knows that condition to be. This is important to bear in mind when rumour is rife.

Dr Knottenbelt has started direct talks with vets in practice to urge them to be aware of who their clients with Fell Ponies are so that any indication of any unusual problems during or after foaling can be referred immediately to him. He needs information and co-operation from as many people as possible. He also needs funding, although to date his work has been done without charge.

Members are starting to come forward with offers to help and, in particular, to raise money for the research. Anyone interested should contact the Secretary, rather than Dr Knottenbelt, who will be glad to hear from you.

JOINT MEASUREMENT BOARD & THE BRITISH HORSE IDENTIFICATION DOCUMENT

On 1st January 1997 the JMB started issuing a new passport style height certificate as an initial step towards the aim of creating the "one horse - one passport" ideal. The document is bound in a special spine which cannot be removed without breaking it, but which can be rebound if additional pages or amendments are required to be inserted or replaced. It does not, however, contain pedigree details, only the name of sire and dam. Some Breed Societies are already producing registration details in a format to be incorporated into this style of document.

Additionally, old style JMB height certificates can be re-issued in the new format at a cost of £10, however, as the FPS is still waiting for final guidance from the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries & Food regarding the passports for Registered Native Ponies, this Society's existing style of Registration Certificate remains in force and will therefore remain separate from the height certificate for the time being.
