PLEASURE RIDE 1996

Fourteen Registered Fell Ponies and seven others (1 Friesian, 1 Highland, 1 Registered Dales, 1 Coloured Cob and 3 Riding Horses) set off from Kirkby Lonsdale Old Station Yard on a rather Grey and drizzly Sunday onto the Roman Road (Wandales Lane) towards Casterton before turning off right up the Fell Road and left along Fellfoot Road (Green Track) towards Barbon, negotiating some very large over blown branches at one point, which required some "man" power to shift as well as Fell pony patience!

Then on past Whelprigg to Barbon Village (no takers to stop at the Barbon Inn!) turning right into Barbon Manor Park which was very colourful at this time of year and riding onto cross Barbon Beck at the Wash Dubbs. The Beck by this time was fairly full, all right for long legsbut a good bit of wading for shorter legs and one

Fell pony decided it would be easier to take a flying leap to get her at least halfway across; just as well the rider had plenty of stickability!

We crossed the Dent to Barbon road to climb up the bridle track to Bullpot Farm (Emergency Telephone at Potholing Club, if required!) at which point the heavens opened and any chance of seeing the usual fine views towards Leck Fell were obliterated so we pressed on quickly to the track over Brownthwaite where we should have been able to see Morcambe Bay and across to Kentmere on a clear day, but we were lucky to see the pony in front as we climbed to about 1300 ft. We then made our way back towards our setting off point along a good green track through Bindloss Farm and back along the Roman Road to Kirkby Lonsdale Old Station Yard, by which time everyone was fairly wet and thankful that we could be slightly dry to eat and drink.

The ride was approximately 13 miles and we completed it in slightly over 3 hours with no lunch time stop due to weather conditions. One of the smallest Fell ponies taking part had also completed a 20+ mile ride the day before held by the Dales Pony Society! Thanks to Joan Hopkinson, Gina Parker, Beth Slater for providing the refreshments and Maureen Charlton for bringing up the rear as she knew the route very well, although not riding a Fell pony. We also sold quite a few Raffle Tickets to non Fell pony members!

Let's hope this year's ride on 26 September enjoys finer weather.

ESSEN EQUITANA 1997

When I was asked if I would like to take my grandfather's Fell pony, Waverhead Black Magic, to Germany for a few days, my initial reaction was excitement. I had hardly been abroad before, never mind taken my pony with me, indeed apart from when he arrived at my Granddad Jim Wykes' yard from Jimmy Bell as a foal, he hadn't travelled far either, now we were looking at going many hundred of miles across the water! My excitement turned to apprehension.

I hurried home to talk to Granddad about the proposal. His reaction was not the same as mind - more like "that sounds expensive"!. Anyway, we decided that providing both Magic and I were considered suitable candidates, we would go and do our best for the Fell Pony Society. We were the only representative of the Society and each of the other 8 native pony breeds were sending a pony. It all looked hard work but sounded a great adventure.

As soon as the BHS confirmed my place I started to get Magic fit for his trip. We do not have any outdoor manege and I work fulltime, there were no daylight hours left to get him fit at home, so he had to be taken to a local livery yard where suitable facilities were available. No doubt the poor lad wondered what had hit him as he usually has a well-earned rest during the winter.

The plan was for us to all meet late in February at Jenny Loriston-Clarke's home where we would spend 4 days being drilled in a musical demonstration ride. After that we would all be taken by lorry to Essen where we would hopefully be one of the star turns at their twice daily shows. Essen Equitana is the biggest equestrian

trade fair in the world and during its 10 day period of opening, up to 250,000 people are expected to pass through the turnstiles. The trade fair caters for every conceivable aspect of equestrian life and not just from Germany, but from all around the world. As a result it is attended by people from every corner of the world with extremely varied interests in equestrian matters.

Everything went well with preparations until the week before we were due to go to Jenny's when I suffered a whip-lash injury due to a car accident. However, as I was determined to go, my physio worked overtime to ensure that I was up to riding and fortunately one of the other riders was trained in alternative medicine, and helped my overcome my problem whilst I was away. Magic had to be lunged for the last few days of his fitness regime. Everything was ready.


We left at 3.30 am to go to Hampshire and arived to find most of the others already there, having lived somewhat nearer than we did. Magic looked at his new surroundings and nodded his approval. From then on, despite one or two fractious moments, we never looked back. He fitted in perfectly with the Welsh Cob who was later to go lame and leave Magic to lead the ride alone. He did not let anybody down in this and truly lived up to his name.

He travelled well in the lorry and came off fresh at the other end, unlike some of the smaller breeds who found the long journey traumatic. We settled the ponies in and then realised it was midnight and we didn't know where we were sleeping ourselves! Eventually it was all sorted out and a tired but happy troupe of riders went to bed. The event itself was a constant whirl of activity; we appeared to be either riding in the musical demonstration that had to be changed each time, or so it seemed, or we were standing with our ponies in a smaller ring whilst someone described the finer points of each of the breeds. There was little time for ourselves and after several days we were all feeling tired.

Fortunately for me, my Mum had previously been to Equitana and had warned me what to expect from the huge crowds, so I held on to Magic as we led the ride into the arena. Magic did not put a foot wrong, he just walked steadily into the ring with his head held proudly and appeared to say "Well, here I am then, take a look at me. Aren't I just a handsome chap?". The crowd were very partisan, clapping, stamping their feet and cheering us on. They wanted everything to be done at the fastest possible pace and jumps - there had to be jumps! Poor Jenny arranged and re-arranged the ride a dozen times before we satisfied everyone.

I can't tell you much about the exhibition itself as I did not have time to look around the 12 halls, yes, I did say 12 halls! All I can say with any certainty is that I came back extremely exhausted but happy in the knowledge that Waverhead Black Magic had once again worked his magic spell, behaved beautifully and been a good representative of the Society. In the three weeks I spent away from home, I made many new friends amongst the other representatives, friendships that I hope will continue for a long time. And yes, Granddad Jim Wykes was right - it was an expensive undertaking, but one I would gladly take on board again, particularly with the experience and knowledge I now have tucked firmly under my belt.

Mrs Janet Butterfield has sent this photo of her father, Mr Albert Orme with Bolton Abbey Supreme FP648G known as Blackie, whom he owns. Blackie's show career only started a couple of years ago but has met with success, including his first Championship at Roydes Hall Show in 1996. He's a described as a cheeky pony who likes to stand on Mr Orme's toes at shows. (You may recall one of his namesake, Bolton Abbey Magic in the Autumn 1996 newletter. re-organising his trophies.) Let's hope there have been more rosettes than bruised feet over the summer!

To Register a Foal: This must be done in the year of its birth and by 31 December (the only exceptions being colt foals out of grading up Section (A) and (B) mares, which must be gelded before registration, and foals bred by Native Heath Breeders which must be registered by 1 April in the year following the foal's birth). A yellow registration application form should be completed and sent to the Secretary together with the dam's record of service slip (provided by stallion owner at time of covering) together with the fee, as above.

Prefixes: A prefix is likened to a breeder's signature. It is not compulsory but for people intending to breed several foals, it is preferable to have one as all stock will be listed together in the Stud Book and it is of much service in tracing the pedigree of an animal. Prefixes tend to be chosen from names of places, farms, areas and without registering such a name, this *cannot* be used in conjunction with the foal's name. Registering a prefix is a simple procedure but as the British Central Prefix Register is a national organisation to which the Society affiliates, it is quite possible your first choice of name has already be registered to a breeder elsewhere in Britain. This is why three choices are required at time of application, in order of preference. The choices must be all single words (no hyphens or spaces allowed) and the completed form should be returned to the Secretary together with the fee of £25 (overseas £45). The procedure takes usually a few weeks to be completed, after which registration of foals can resume as normal. Application forms on request from the Secretary.

Stallion Licensing: For procedure to licence refer to Spring 1997 Newsletter. It should be noted that a colt which has been passed for licensing by veterinary inspection is not actually licensed until such licence is issued by the Secretary, together with the service book, and should not be used for stud purposes before. Please return all stallion service books by 1st September to the Secretary.

NEWS FROM ABROAD

Townend Sparky leads the way in Sweden

Valerie Pettersson, a member from Arsunda in Sweden, has been busy promoting the breed and the Society at a 10 day show called Hastivalen, at Gavle. She was accompanied throughout by her daughter Emily and Townend Sparky FP50155G, her 4 year old Fell gelding, who was a major attraction. He was sandwiched in an enclosure between a Morgan horse and a Miniature Shetland mare with foal at foot, and was much photographed.

The show attracted 35,000 visitors in all, many of whom had their own firm idea as to Sparky's breeding, despite Valerie's helpful notices to the contrary. She had an amusing time overhearing some of their conversations. However, he was recognised by a few and praised as being the only pony worth seeing at the show by one admirer! This person clearly had taste!

Being young, Sparky had not experienced being put on display before and at first found all the noise and bustle a bit disconcerting, which interrupted his eating programme. However, being a true Fell, he soon worked out it was a waste not to graze and take in the sights, and developed a technique of eating and whinnying simultaneously to let the passing horses know he was there! The results of a survey of 1,000 riders by Gallop! magazine recently? These included:


- Nearly 50% of riders said they would not be able to choose between their husband or boyfriend and their horse, whilst one quarter said the horse would win hands down!

The Williamson family sadly report the tragic loss of their lovely mare. Maydew was a prolific winner both in hand and under saddle. She represented the Fell Pony Society at Olympia in 1995 and was Best of Breed. She was Ridden Champion and Supreme Champion at the Southern Fell Pony Show; at NCPA Cumbria Show she was Reserve Supreme in Hand in 1994 & 1996 and Supreme Ridden M & M in 1995. 


