PAMSHAPS Tour of the North of England

Brian Eaton of Davenport in Cheshire is, in his own words, a "restored geriatric in his seventieth year", who is planning a tour by horse starting in May 1998. The route covers the area from Stockport in the south, to Hexham in the north, York, Ripon & Barnard Castle in the east, and Brampton, Penrith, Kirkby Lonsdale & Burnley in the west and will take until October to complete. Similarities will be drawn with a tour undertaken in circa 1770 by Arthur Young and others before him.

Brian was Director of Personnel & Management Services for Stockport MBC for 17 years until a stroke in 1989 forced his retirement. Following several heart attacks, he had quadruple bypass heart surgery in 1996 and is now fit and raring to go.

His association with horses started early with the encouragement of his grandfather in 1935, a stockman and horseman, and has involved working draft horses, stable lad, point to point jockey, Army Horse Transport service and showjumping trainer! He is being re-familiarised with packhorse training at the Defence Animal Centre, Melton Mowbray, having last done this training at Aldershot 50 years ago!

He will ride a rescued 15 hh Connemara gelding and is looking for a Fell of 13hh or less to loan or hire as his pack pony. The journey will record some of the historic roads and trackways of yesteryear which are still negotiable on horseback, whilst raising money for Peoples Acute Medical Services and Horse & Pony Sanctuaries. None of the donations are being used to subsidise the expedition itself. He is also being supported by the RSPCA, the Police and a farrier.

A journey of this type takes much preparation and importantly the team of man and equines needs to get used to one another before setting off if they are to succeed. 

It seemed too fair to trail my two ponies down from Crieff in Scotland for the pleasure ride, and so I cadged a lift from Glenis Cockbain who lent me Carrock Amanda for the day. All I had to do was turn up at her farm and help her load the ponies. Admittedly, I usually enjoy preparing ponies for an event as much as the eventual event, so it seemed odd to have Glenis acting as a groom, but she was very cheery about it.

We met at the lovely village of Dufton, near Appleby and soon everyone was gathered on a grassy area, kindly lent by Mr Howe. Mrs Elsie Dargue and her daughter Pauline Robson provided an endless supply of coffee and delicious home made ginger bread, whilst we tacked up and stashed our gear away in saddle bags or rucksacks. She weather looked surprisingly promising but no one was taking any chances, and stuffed waterproofs in, just in case. My theory that the Northern England people are amongst the most sociable in the world was proved once more, and I soon realised that the crack was going to be excellent. I must admit that I had been looking forward to this day for weeks, and the sun was even shining on us which seemed too much to hope for.

We set off at a good Fell pony pace. I succeeded in dropping my jacket in the first five minutes and was left behind. Amanda gave me a great demonstration of her spanking trot as she took off in pursuit of the departing black cavalcade, whilst I was still struggling to get my feet back in the stirrups.

We were thirteen in all, which included one very solid piebald cob with her equally colourful jockey, Bobby McCaw, and Glenis' Dales mare, High House Tilly, who had recently qualified for Olympia, but was showing that she was equally adept out on the high tops as in the show nng. The ride was lead by Derek Byass on Peepings Moss Rose who, dressed in western tack, had been born and spent much of her life on the fells we were to cross.

Unfit ponies were certainly not showing any difficulties and it was only their profuse sweating which gave the game away, as they charged up the fell-side at breakneck pace. As we climbed higher and higher above the village, the views were spectacular with the

wonderful dykes and small fields so typical of the area, very apparent and stretching below us like a child's drawing of a map. We were following a track round High Cup Gill, a wonderfully spectactular punchbowl with sheer sides running into the valley far below. Far beneath us the beck sparkled a little silver snake and the sun tried to peep through the low cloud.

Derek suggested that as we were to go round the infamous High Cup Nick, perhaps some of use would prefer to walk. Many of us hastily got off and gingerly started to follow one another in single file. However, the going was not nearly as bad as it had sounded and though there were a few narrow craggy spots, it was not as vertiginous as we had anticipated. Most of us soon got back on board.

We all stood on the tops with the wind ruffling the wonderful manes and tails of our mounts, and surveyed the scene. Bobby McCaw's feisty mare pricked up her ears and started to jig about a little. She had spotted a pack of fell hounds out ahead of us, streaming across the greeny-grey landscape like white flakes of snow. He seemed glad of his pelham, as perhaps without it his keen mare might have been off to join in the hunt! Most of the other ponies were eager to participate too and everyone was on their toes for a while.

On the top of High Cup Plain we met a herd of "Peepings" ponies belonging to the Dargues and some belonging to Mr Howe. Derek asked if we would like to have a closer look and of course we all did. The free ponies were intregued by this intrusion on their privacy and wanted to eye us up as much as we they. I loved the incredible length of some of the mare's manes and their bristly moustaches, which most of our lush grass fed beasts lose. Once we had avoided the possibility of a rodeo, we decided that we were all hungry and dismounted for our lunch. The ponies were soon munching the rough moorland grasses they rarely see these days, and enjoying our apples and other delicacies. Beer was fizzily opened by Bobby and savoured by both he and his characterful mare. Everybody was in fine fettle and still there was no rain in sight, although with the wind we were pleased we had brought our jackets. It was in fact a perfect day and for me far more enjoyable than any show, or riding club event.

Our descent was fairly stony and craggy, and there were frequent stops to capture the day on immortal celluloid. My camera had become quite damp from being in the saddlebags against poor Amanda's sweating flanks, and it was hard to take a decent picture while she insisted on rubbing her itchy head against me.

We had an amusing escapade with some naughty Shetlanders which rudely barged out through one of the gates on Peeping Hill. However, following some western cattle handling skills, a good deal of shouting and more than the occasional Anglo-Saxon oath, the skittish wee ponies were eventually rounded up and put back onthe right side of the hill gate.

The village loomed closer and I just did not want to get back at all. It had been so wonderful to be doing exactly what a Fell pony is best at. Not being of the show mentality, I was in my element and my only regret was that I had not been able to bring my own ponies down. Just before the village we passed a farmhouse selling teas and ice cream. Glenis, Penny, Derek and I were now at the back and decided to stop for some ice cream. Amanda disgraced herself by taking a rude bite out of the owner's tub of bedding plants. This last vibrant show of late summer colour was wiped out in an instant. Despite her misdemeanour, I gave her my ice cream as she had really been very good and earned it. She thanked me by dribbling most of down my sleeve.

Back at the green, Mrs Elsie Dargue and Pauline were there providing yet more victuals for us, and were interested to hear how we had fared on the hill. It was an epic day full of fun, where all the ponies had behaved impeccably and everyone had enjoyed the lovely views. If Glenis will have me next year, I will definitely be back; spending a day on the fells with a speedy, sure-footed Fell pony, beats showing any day and is quite the best way to take in all that marvellous scenery.

Fell Ponies in Switzerland <u>Diana Slack</u>

I bought my first Fell pony eighteen years ago at the sale of registered Fell ponies at Wigton. She was the two year old filly Lowmoat Nora. For several years we used Holly, as we named her, finding her an unusually willing and exciting ride. Barbara showed her under saddle and together they won a lot of prizes. When the time came to breed from Holly, her first filly foal was born in 1992, Raisbeck Gem. Gem was followed by two colt foals, Raisbeck Rueben and Raisbeck Barney.

As I had always been reluctant to sell my ponies at a horse sale, it was with great trepidation that I took both Gem and Barney (then a yearling colt) to the 1995 Fell Pony sale at Penrith. Barney became Champion in the pre-sale show and was sold to Mr John Stammers, Suffolk, who works with carriage driving horses who hoped to yoke Barney when old enough. Gem was 2nd in the ridden class and was sold to Peter and Lotti Moor of Grund, Switzerland. They also purchased a further 3 fillies from Eddie and Margaret Wilson, being Townend Scilla, Laurel and Dawn, and the stallion Townend Heath. These ponies and Gem were transported to Grund in December 1995.

In June 1996, Joanne and I were invited to stay with Peter and Lotti and their then new Fell pony family (Scilla had had a filly foal, Silka). We weren't prepared for the breathtaking beauty of our 3 hour car journey from Zurich airport to Grund, only 2 miles past Gstaad, the winter ski resort. Joanne and I arrived during a spectacular thunderstorm on the Saturday evening and we were welcomed warmly by Peter and Lotti into their lovely chalet. The land where the ponies live and where the hay is made was farmed by Lotti's parents. There is an old barn with stalls for the cows and a loft above to store the hay. Part of the chalet was lived in by Lotti's parents, but it has since been extended to make more spacious living quarters.

On Sunday we rode Heath and Gem (and 2 bikes) into the village of Saanen to visit and drink wine with Peter's parents. Have you ever drunk wine and then had to ride a Fell pony 4 or 5 miles home, along narrow wooded paths beside a river?


The week was happily spent riding, swimming in ice-cold mountain lakes, visiting family and friends, and shopping in the beautiful city of Bern. During a cable car trip to the top of Les Diablerets Mountains, Joanne and I met an Indian film crew and Miss Universe 1994!

We rode the ponies on a 2 day trip into the mountains. First to Peter and Lotti's "Heidi Hut" for lunch on the lower slopes, and then onto the farmhouse in the mountains. Here we drank wine, swam in the lake of Saanerslock, played bowls in the cow shed and slept at night on wooden beds. We rose early next morning to climb to the top of our mountain (I wasn't sure that part was so much fun) to watch the sunrise and drink hot tea from a flask. We could see the dazzling snow-capped mountains and sheep on the slopes, their bells tinkling.

Lotti took Joanne and I to visit their friends the Burger family who farmed about 60 miles away at Zollbruck. They had bought Townend Laurel and Dawn. Laurel has since had a filly foal and Dawn a colt foal, both by Drybarrows Jeff.

Unfortunately Sunday came, Joanne and I had to say our goodbyes and a big thank you for their wonderful hospitality and friendship. We had to leave their Fell pony family and the "little slopes" of beautiful Switzerland.

I have since received photographs of the ponies, their backs laden with heavy luggage during their days of trekking over the mountains, doing what Gem loves best working hard. There was also a photograph of Gem with Peter and her trophy as Swiss National Champion Pony. I always knew she was special.

"Where did all those Browns come from?" Barry Allen

At the Windermere Show, several people commented on the apparent resurgence of brown ponies. The British hill pony which was probably the foundation of most our present British native ponies was brown but generally was lost to the more dominant genes of the horses and ponies crossed with them (the Exmoor being the only exception). As my own interest in them has grown over the years, at the back of my mind has been the thought that we should not lose these attractive ponies. The same thing has been said about the grey Fells. Time dims the memory but my recollection of the early 1980's is of considerably more brown ponies at the Fell pony sales than we see nowadays. It always seemed however that black ponies were preferred. I also remember, in my first year in Cumbria, visiting Keswick Show, where Henry Harrison seemed to have up to a dozen (in reality probably less!) of his brown Sleddale ponies covered in rosettes. They were all very much of a type and, looking back, this is probably where my own interest began, although I have owned and bred only black until recently.

So what is the reality of the situation? Are browns - and indeed greys - in danger of being lost? I decided to look through the stud books for comparisons. There are problems in doing this, of course. Prior to 1993, ponies could be registered at any age. We now record ponies bred in Holland and Germany, and the 1996 stud book shows browns and greys bred in Europe. I decided to include all ponies registered in a particular year. In the case of foals, I noted the colour at birth. Brown was taken to include all shades including bay. Black/grey was included as grey. These are the results:

Betty Walker carried out a far more detailed analysis of colour and markings in Fell ponies in a previous newsletter and she found that, with far fewer ponies registered, brown was the dominant colour in 1920. Within ten years, however, black accounted for 73% of registrations. By 1971, brown Fells represented 30% of registrations.

It is said that there are lies, damned lies, and statistics, so it would be wrong to read too much into these figures. It could be argued, however, that the percentage of browns registered has fallen from 64% when records began to only 12.6% in 1996. My own view is that in numerical terms there has been little change over the past 35 years. Grey ponies, if anything, seem more popular and there is a nucleus of breeders of brown ponies to satisfy the market.

Returning to the Windermere Show, it could just be that judges are now looking on brown ponies with a little more favour, which encourages owners to take them to the shows.


