# Secretary's Report, Autumn 2008

I've just checked what I wrote in last year's Autumn magazine and found that I said, "...preparations for Lowther and the Breed Show (it would be so much easier if they weren't on consecutive weekends)." Obviously the Show Committee took that on board, but perhaps I didn't mean that we should have them on consecutive days! Actually, the preparation as far as the office was concerned went relatively smoothly - it just went pear-shaped when Lowther cancelled us at the last minute and Margaret Murray appeared on my doorstep at 8.30 pm the night before the Lowther show was due to take place. We had a very busy hour or so ringing round; (the number of times I heard "but I've just bathed my pony!") we did manage to contact most people, but asking for mobile phone numbers on entry forms might have given us a 100% success rate - something to remember in the future. Having gone onto the Lowther Show field on Friday afternoon, I have to say I think they made the right decision - the mud at the Breed Show was nothing in comparison to Lowther on the Friday; it must have been a nightmare by the time they decided to cancel the whole event on Sunday. I thought the Breed Show went extremely well, despite the appalling weather in the morning - it was a great relief when it did fine up and we could pack up in the dry. thought it was very brave of the field owners to allow us to go ahead, and the tractor driver did a brilliant job. We had visitors/exhibitors from the Netherlands, Germany, France. Switzerland, Northern Ireland and the USA, so it was a very cosmopolitan day. As usual, I didn't see much of the showing - it's only when I'm typing the results up for the website that I get to know what happened. The Stallion Show had the best weather of our shows this year - it was hot! That must have been summer; it's been downhill all the way since then, with many local shows cancelled again. Mv favourite day out was the Open day at Waverhead, blessed with fine weather, very well attended, superb food and really enjoyable to chat to people in a relaxed, non-competitive situation many thanks to Barbara, Hilary and family for hosting it.

I didn't achieve my aim of getting the 2007 Stud Book out for the AGM, but it was available for the Stallion Show unfortunately we've had to increase the price to £6, as £5 didn't cover the printing costs - one of the penalties of increasing foal numbers! Foal registrations are starting to arrive in a steady stream; the usual plea - if you're entering foals in the Annual Sale, please get your registrations sent in soon, well before the closing date for the Sale.

I attended a very interesting meeting in early July, together with other Breed Secretaries, at a legal firm who were giving us advice on compliance with changes to Company and Charity Law. As a small organisation, I think it is very important that we join with others to share knowledge and keep up to date with changes that affect our Society. I also attended a meeting of users of our Breed Society software, where various enhancements to the system were demonstrated and I'm pleased to report that Council agreed that we could upgrade our system, which should make things easier and more streamlined in the office.

Membership is remaining steady at around 1200 and our finances are healthy. Merchandise sales have done well at the shows, and the 2009 calendar and Christmas card are available now - see the pictures and prices on the back pages of this magazine.

Held at Lowther Parish Hall, Hackthorpe on Saturday 29 March 2008

Miss Longsdon opened the meeting and thanked those present for attending. During the winter there had been three sad deaths:

Frances Bell of the Waverhead Stud, a serious loss to the Society and a legend in her own time;

Neville Barlow who bred the Mardledale ponies in East Anglia, and Joe Thompson, Askhamgate ponies, a member of the Society for years and with Fell ponies all his life, carrying on the prefix from his father.

She asked members to stand in remembrance of them.

#### 1 Apologies for absence

Apologies were received from: Ms S Albrecht, Mrs F and Miss L Awde, Miss B Bell, Mr & Mrs J M Billings, Mr P Boustead, Miss A Carslaw, Mrs S and Misses J & L Charlton, Mrs G Cockbain, Ms J Fairburn, Mrs H Fawcett, Mrs P Finch, Mr & Mrs W Ford and Miss D Ford, Mrs A Garcia, Mr M Goddard, Mrs D Key, Mr & Mrs A Morland, Miss A and Mr G Morton, Mr & Mrs R Muttitt, Mrs J Reekie, Mr W Robinson, Mrs A Shuker, Mr J Waples and Mrs J Ward.

#### 2 Approval and adoption of Autumn General Meeting Minutes and Extraordinary General Meeting minutes of 20 October 2007

Acceptance of the AGM minutes was proposed by Mrs S Brunskill and seconded by Miss J Glass.

Acceptance of the EGM minutes was proposed by Mr J Greener and seconded by Mr G H B Mallinson.

### 3 Matters arising from the minutes of the Autumn General Meeting held on 20 October 2007

Miss Longsdon said that the Fell Pony DVD was progressing well and Clive Richardson was getting together with Alan Tibbitts to work on the narrative; it would possibly be ready by the summer.

The Southern Show would be held at the same venue as last year, Berkshire College near Maidenhead. It would be the 20<sup>th</sup> show and anyone who wanted to make the journey would be very welcome.

Derek Scott had retired from being our solicitor and Council had decided that he should be presented with the Queen Elizabeth Trophy this year. He has been an important part of the Society for many years, helping us in the process of becoming a Limited Company and then in attaining Charitable status. He was unable to be present today but had written to us and was most grateful, sending his thanks and best wishes.

A group had been set up to organise the trotting races, Richard Savage being the Chairman. Miss Longsdon asked him to say a few words and he thanked those who had helped and taken part last year. They proposed to hold five events this year; at the Cumbria Fell and Dales Show, South Cumbria Show, Tebay Show, Crosby Ravensworth Show and finally at Lowgrounds Farm followed by a barbecue. There would be a stall at the Stallion Show selling second hand tack etc to raise funds. He emphasised that the events were intended to be fun, though they could get quite competitive, and they need lots of people to take part. Schedules were available on the platform and would be on the Society's website.

Miss Longsdon said that Vyv Wood-Gee was going to give her talk about her journey with Fell ponies from John O'Groats to Lands End to the Midlands West group on 1 November. There had also been two changes in the running of the Support Groups: the North West group was going to be run by the Fell Breeders Association and she extended our thanks to Beverley Hodgson for all the work she had done in getting the group started; the South East group was now being run by Roger and Sue Muttitt - again, thanks were due to Charmian Ross-Thomson who had started it up and was now handing over.

Council had discussed the various ideas on stallion licensing raised at the Autumn meeting - it was difficult to do something that suited everyone; ponies in the UK, Europe and the USA needed to be dealt with in the same way, so eventually they had decided to leave the situation as it was.

There was a piece on foal syndrome in the Spring magazine, giving details of new work being done on a carrier test. The Animal Health Trust had been given a grant of £113,000 for research so we would need to wait and see if they get any results.

Miss Longsdon said how pleased she was about the voting at the EGM which had allowed the Society to continue employing Mrs Wilkinson; it was a very satisfactory result and we were very grateful for the Charity Commission they had been extremely helpful in getting the situation dealt with correctly.

### 4 Chairman's Report

Miss Longsdon welcomed everyone again, especially our outgoing President, Mrs Newall.

The Show Sub-Committee had updated our Showing Rules - copies had been sent out to all members with the Spring magazine and she asked that members please read them carefully and take them on board. It was up to members to keep to the rules of the Society and it made life much easier for everyone if they did. A Complaints and Disciplinary Procedure had been prepared, with advice from the NPS and other bodies; Miss Longsdon commented that she couldn't help feeling that it was sad that we needed this, but copies would be sent out with all show entries and with the Autumn magazine, and it would be added to the information on the website. Council had put a lot of time and effort into this and she was appreciative of all they had done and of their loyalty and support over the last year, particularly Mrs Robinson, an excellent Vice Chairman.

Miss Longsdon thanked Mr Good for another excellent magazine and informed members that Council had had some preliminary discussions about the possibility of producing a year book and asked Mr Good to explain this to members. Mr Good suggested that all the show results could be moved into one book published at the end of each year with space for studs to advertise - this book could be available to members and anyone else interested in the breed - it would be useful for people not in the society who wanted to find out where they could buy ponies. There could also be a photo gallery where members could submit their photos for a nominal fee. The publishing costs could be partly covered by the magazine being smaller - what did members think? There was a positive response on a show of hands -Miss Longsdon said Council would discuss this further and report back to the Autumn Meeting. Several questions were raised - it was confirmed that it was not the intention to replace the magazines. The general feeling was that members would approve if it was free but would not want to pay for it on top of their subscription, particularly as much of the information was already available on the website.

Miss Longsdon then thanked Mrs Parkin and Mrs Wilkinson for keeping everything up to date and efficient in the office, and the Brunskill family and Miss Glass for all their work selling our merchandise; she hope she hadn't forgotten to mention anyone - the Society ran with the help of its volunteers who were much appreciated.

Lastly she thanked Mrs Newall who had been an excellent President over the last two years; she had regularly attended Council meetings and given Council the benefit of her wealth of experience. She had also hosted a lovely Open Day at her stud last year. Members applauded to show their thanks and appreciation.

The Society's new President was Mrs Gwen Williamson - she thanked members and said it was an honour to be appointed. Miss Longsdon thanked her for agreeing to take it on.

### 5 Result of Postal Voting for Council Members

The following four candidates were elected for the full term of five years:

Miss Barbara Bell, Mr Thomas Capstick, Mrs Margaret Murray and Mr David Wilkinson. Due to resignations, there were also two vacancies for one year only and the following candidates would fill those spaces:

Mr Barry Mallinson and Mr Colin Roberts.

Miss Longsdon thanked all the candidates for standing for election and promised that Council would do their best to work them to death over the next few years! She particularly thanked Mr David Howe for standing and hoped that he would stand again.

# 6 Adoption of Accounts for year ended 31 October 2007

Mrs Parkin informed members that there had been a change this year in the preparation of the accounts. Langdales, our accountants, had taken the decision to give up their registered auditor status after the introduction of international auditing standards, as the cost of compliance would be prohibitive for the size of their They were still able to practice. prepare our accounts as in previous years, and had proposed that they would have them audited by a firm with whom they already had an However, further arrangement. investigation showed that, as a small charity, we were under the thresholds for turnover and assets necessitating a full audit, and an Accountants report was sufficient for the Charity Commission requirements, so we had decided to go ahead with this, particularly as it should result in a reduction in our bill!

Despite the fact that two instalments were paid for the DVD, the only unusual item in the accounts, we had still made a surplus on the year; this was largely due to general increased activity in registrations and transfers, merchandise sales and a sizeable increase in donations, some of which had been specifically towards the DVD. We were very grateful to those members who made donations, and to our patron, Her Majesty the Queen their generosity was much appreciated.

There were no questions from members and adoption of the accounts was proposed by Mr Greener and seconded by Mrs Morton.

### 7 Resolution to appoint HPH Chartered Accountants and Registered Auditors as Auditors to the Society and to authorise the Council to fix their remuneration

As mention above, a full audit was no longer required, an Accountants report being sufficient for our needs. It was proposed by Miss Walker and seconded by Mrs Brunskill that we continue to use Langdales to prepare our accounts and any necessary reports.

Miss Longsdon thanked Mrs Parkin for her work as Treasurer.

### 8 Secretary/Treasurer's Report

Mrs Parkin told members that it had been a very busy winter in the office she and Mrs Wilkinson seemed to have been chasing their tails since the New Year. They had finished registering all last year's foals, including the one that was born on Boxing Day! She had hoped to try and have the 2007 Stud Book ready for the AGM, but it wasn't to be, with other commitments getting in the way, so hopefully it would be available at the Stallion show in May. The 2009 calendar was available and was on sale at the stand today.

The reminder slips for unpaid subscriptions, included with the mailing of the Spring magazine, had provoked a very positive response - just over 900 members had renewed so far and she was sure there would be one or two more when people started doing their show entries and realised that they've forgotten to renew their membership. Schedules and entry forms for the shows could be downloaded from our website and there were paper copies on the platform for those who preferred to collect them today.

She had attended the NPS M & M meeting at Stoneleigh last month. The NPS and BHS had both written to BEVA to ask why microchips must be inserted by veterinary surgeons in this country and not by trained licensed operators as is the case in Europe. We were also given information about differences in Scottish law regarding equine passports - she needed to confirm the details on this and then publicise it to our Scottish members. The NPS and BHS were also pursuing problems in France where some breeds, including the Fell, are not recognised by Haras Nationaux, and also in Germany where local societies are issuing passports and licensing stallions without reference to the relevant Breed Societies.

On the financial side, our bank accounts were still looking healthy, with the Trust Fund at over £9,000, the

Deposit Account at £40,800 and just under £3,000 in the current account, and all the instalments for the production of the DVD have now been paid. We had had confirmation of our grant from the Horserace Betting Levy Board, £5,700, which is much appreciated and pays our performance premiums and microchipping subsidies, and they were very interested to hear about our forthcoming DVD and were looking forward to seeing it.

Finally, Mrs Parkin thanked Katherine for all her hard work in the office, and Mary and the Council for their help and support, and said that she was looking forward to the show season and the opportunity to get out and meet people.

# 9 Reports from Delegates and Sub-Committees

Miss Longsdon said that Mrs Parkin had already reported on meetings with the NPS. Michael Goddard had attended a BHS meeting at which there had been a talk from Richard Drummond from Defra on infectious equine diseases which may come to this country as a result of climate change papers were available form the office if members wanted more information and could also be found on the Defra website.

Mrs Robinson reported that there had been no meetings of the Conservation Grazing Sub-Committee through the winter, but that the Society had been offered land for grazing six to ten ponies in the Forest of Bowland - the legal documentation needed was being progressed and it was hoped that this would go forward. There were one or two other ideas in the pipeline. Mrs Jones, Judges Sub-Committee, said that one new judge had been appointed to the panel - Mr Michael Rawlinson. Anyone interested in being assessed for Judges training needed to have been a member of the Society for five consecutive years and should contact her for more information. This year's assessment was scheduled for 27 September in Penrith.

Mrs Murray, Show Sub-Committee, said that everything was in had for this vear's shows. There would be a new show field for the South Cumbria Show at the Westmorland Showground which would give us more space than last year. She encouraged members to submit their entries in good time, and reminded them that this year our show at Lowther was on Friday 8 August, followed by our Breed Show at Brougham on Saturday 9 August - it was horrifying thought from a an organisational point of view and anyone offers of help would be gratefully received. There were also some changes of classes at the South Cumbria Show - there would be no Best Turned Out class, but there was a new Lead Rein class and a First Ridden instead - she hoped this would be encouraging for younger people.

Mrs Millard, Overseas Sub-Committee, reported that Mr Woolley had resigned and that Mrs Robinson was now the representative for North America, with Mrs Murray taking over Switzerland and Austria. Other representatives remained the same and they were considering appointing a representative for Denmark in view of the numbers of ponies and members there. There had been correspondence with the American Livestock Breeds Conservancy

(the American equivalent of our Rare Breeds Survival Trust) who had been listing Fells and Dales together, despite strong opposition from both Societies and they had finally agreed to separate the breeds in their records. Mrs Robinson would be judging at an M & M show in the US in September - there would be five Fell classes. The South Germany group had had a busy year, but the French branch would not be holding a show this year as the number of members did not make it financially viable. Fleur Hallam was having a book of her photographs of Fell ponies published later in the year and a lady in Sweden had offered to translate FPS documents.

Mr Charlton, reporting on behalf of Mrs Hill for the Publicity, Promotions and Projects Sub-Committee, said that Mrs Hill had recently visited Mrs Gina Feakins in Australia, where she has recently emigrated together with twenty three Fell ponies. They were not aware of any other Fells in Australia. though Mr Charlton remembered that the Fell Champion at the NPS show in 1949 went out there. He reminded members about the Sandringham weekend in May which included the opportunity for an organised ride and drive round the estate. Information about the weekend's events, accommodation and stabling etc could be found on the FPS website.

The North West Support Group had the following events forthcoming:

The Cumbria Fells & Dales show on 31 May with NPS qualifiers

A ride and drive from Dufton on 14 September, organised by David Howe

A Foal Show at Penrith on 1 November Mrs Walker (formerly Mothersole) had taken over the North East group - Miss Longsdon congratulated her on her recent marriage and wished her all the very best. A member near Blanchland had offered to organise a pleasure ride in the autumn, 15 miles of moorland and forest tracks - anyone interested should contact Mrs Walker. She hoped in the longer term to plan a social event for each autumn/winter and a pleasure ride for the summer, as the area was already well supplied with If members wanted other events. anything else, would they please let her know.

Miss Longsdon reported that the Midlands West group had a full programme of events planned: the Derbyshire Fells & Dales show was at Bakewell on 22 June and Michael Goddard was judging the Fells; a social for new members was planned for the end of April at the Scotgate Stud in Ashbourne; a visit to the local Blue Cross Horse Rescue Centre at Burton was being arranged and there would be the usual 'Leg It' - see the magazine for more details.

Miss Glass reported on the several social events of the Midlands East group through the winter, including a very successful points presentation evening. Mrs Poole was organising a series of rides and small shows through the summer which were excellent opportunities for nervous/ inexperienced children and adults to have a go for the first time.

The South East Group had a ride organised for 1 June in East Sussex.

Mr Ian Smith, our Press Officer, said that show reports and photographs should feature in a number of magazines this year - he was still interested in getting more information from our members in the South of England so that he could publicise and promote our ponies.

Mr Charlton said that the Performance Trials would go ahead this year as normal - he apologised for the absence of a report in the magazine there had been confusion about who was preparing the report. He had been honoured to represent the Society at Westminster Abbey in November at a service celebrating the sixtieth anniversary of the Queen and the Duke of Edinburgh.

Mr David Murray FRGS FMA briefly updated members on his work on conservation grazing and semi feral herds and stressed the importance of maintaining the herds on their native ground. He was also trying to put together a route along Hadrian's Wall which could be walked with pack ponies and asked for help from members who could assist with getting permission from landowners to do this.

#### 10 Members' Suggestions

Mrs Morton raised the issue of the new animal welfare transport regulations - various members expressed confusion over what was actually required - Miss Longsdon stressed that individual requirements could differ and that it was up to each individual to check - it was not a Society matter.

Mr Smith asked what the Society was doing to encourage the keeping of semi feral ponies on the hill - Miss Longsdon replied that this had been discussed at length in Council and that one of the problems identified was the ageing of our breeders and the lack of someone to take over from them. We had contacted the RBST with our concerns and if we were to come up with a specific scheme to help the semi feral herds, there was a possibility of some funding. She asked members for their ideas and stressed the importance of our 'reservoir' of semi feral ponies to keep the breed true to type.

There was considerable discussion on this subject with many and varied suggestions as to what could be done, ranging from requesting Defra to stop restricting the numbers of ponies on the fell to the Society buying Fell grazing and encouraging young people in the Society to learn more about breeding semi feral ponies. Mr Murray suggested that the Society should try to get the RBST to recognise the semi ferals as a sub-population for grant purposes, as it does with some other breeds. Mr Smith felt that the Society should get the hill breeders together and talk to them about their ideas and suggestions. Miss Longsdon assured members that Council would discuss these issues and report back to the Autumn meeting.

Miss Meikle said that as she had not been a member of the Society for long, she found it difficult when voting for Council to know what each individual did and asked if minutes from the various committees could be published on the website to help members make a more informed decision. Miss Longsdon pointed out that there was an issue of confidentiality in some of the matters that are minuted, but said that Council would look into it.

### 11 Any Other Business

Miss Longsdon thanked Miss Glass for organising the raffle and encouraged members to buy tickets. There was to be an Open Day at the Waverhead Stud on Sunday 15 June, by kind invitation of Barbara Bell and family - the day would start at 10.30 and there would be food available - all were welcome to attend.

Miss Longsdon and Miss Glass were attending the Yorkshire Game Fair at Harewood House on 25 and 26 May and need a nice smiley pony to be on the stand - if anyone could help, please let them know as soon as possible.

Mrs Robinson read out a letter from Amanda Coates who had showed Brackenbank Megan for Mr & Mrs Wilkinson last year. She spoke of her happy memories of riding Megan, who had sadly died earlier this year, and had donated a trophy in memory of a very special pony, which was to be awarded to the best ridden Fell pony mare at a competition of the Wilkinsons' choice.

Mrs Robinson presented the awards for the Performance Points - Miss Longsdon congratulated all the competitors and thanked Mrs Robinson for organising it all.

Finally, Miss Longsdon thanked all those who had prepared the teas there was no charge but members were encouraged to make handsome donations.

### Joe Thompson (Askhamgate Ponies) 1928-2008

Joe Thompson was born at Askhamgate Farm, the eldest of 4 boys. He farmed all his life, and followed his father's interests in cattle and Fell ponies.

The ponies came from lines kept by his father and grandfather in the early years of the 20<sup>th</sup> century, when the family lived in Heltondale. Joe did not register many of his Fells, concentrating most of his attention on his Shorthorn, Ayrshire and Friesian dairy cattle and mixed livestock.

He was a quiet man, but always willing to share stories, such as his father buying up 3-year-old geldings from neighbours and thus cornering the market when the mine representatives came to buy ponies for the collieries in County Durham.

He married Ann Robinson of Low Lane, Tebay, whose father set up the Lunesdale Hunt. Joe was well known in the area as a stalwart supporter of the Lunesdale and Ullswater Hunts, and a sweet-voiced singer of both traditional songs and those of his own composition.

He is survived by Ann, and their four children. We send them our condolences and good wishes for Stephen's continuing interest in Fell ponies.

# 🍸 Semi-Feral Herds

With an ever-increasing membership and a record number of foals registered last year, the Fell Pony Society is certainly thriving. There are now people breeding Fells over the whole length of the country and Fell ponies are now to be found in increasing numbers in America and Europe and even as far away as Australia.

However, underneath all these positive indications for the future of the breed, there is another statistic that is a worry. The numbers of ponies that are running on the fells in Cumbria are falling, and on some fells they have disappeared altogether. Over the last twenty years or so, as the numbers of ponies and breeders countrywide has increased significantly, so the numbers of ponies and the people breeding them in their natural environment in Cumbria has fallen.

Today there are only nine hill breeders left that run their ponies on the open fell, and of these, only a handful have a significant number of breeding mares. A few more of these breeders are nearing retirement and have reduced their numbers down to only a handful.

In the last decade around ten hill herds have gone, the Heltondale and Tebay herds included, which were two of the largest herds running on the fells. Why then is this happening in the breed's heartland, when all around them the popularity and demand for the Fell pony is at an all time high? Undoubtedly, the answer to that lies not with the ponies themselves, but



with the people that own them. These ponies that run the Cumbrian fells are all owned by hill farmers, and like other farmers all over the country, they have had to suffer many major changes and pressures and a huge increase in the levels of bureaucracy and red tape associated with the running of their businesses over the last fifteen or twenty years. One of the results of that is that many of the youngsters that would in the past have followed on in these hill farms have sought employment with better reward elsewhere. Some that have followed their parents on in the farm just had no interest in the ponies.

So one of the major reasons for the decline in pony numbers in these semiferal herds is the lack of young people following on and willing to keep the ponies. Of the hill breeders that are left, only two have young family that are intrested in keeping the ponies on. One of those is Colin Roberts who, along with his sons, runs the Bybeck ponies on the Howgills at Tebay. While so many of the old established herds are being lost, they have come in and established a new herd that offers a glimmer of hope for the future.

Some may ask, since the breed is increasing and in good heart, if it really matters where the ponies are being bred? It is obviously encouraging and healthy for the breed to have so many breeders establishing studs all over the country and indeed there have been established studs breeding Fell ponies many miles away from Cumbria for a long time. However, the vast majority of these studs come back to Cumbria again and again, to the hill bred ponies, for breeding stock to introduce into their herds in order to keep them true to type.

Fell ponies have been on the Cumbrian fells for hundreds of years

and it was the environment and their management in it that made them what they are today. Taken away from the fells and bred on better ground with a different type of management, these ponies quite quickly lose many of the traits that make the breed what it is today, and it is for this reason that the hill bred ponies are so vital to the breed and why other breeders need to keep coming back for an infusion of 'hill blood' now and again.

With so many ponies being bred away from the hills, now more than ever it is essential to retain these hill herds for other breeders to go back to in order to keep the breed true to type with the characteristic movement and hardiness for which it is renowned. It is a situation that is recognised and being looked at by the Fell Pony Society Council, but one to which there are no easy answers.

### A Walk on the Wild Side

Cumbria's Fell ponies are as special as the Dartmoor or New Forest ponies, but not as well known. 'A Walk on the Wild Side' hopes to redress the balance and

# Tride of the North" Ride

Perhaps 100 years ago, riding a horse across the North Pennines would not have been considered unusual, but in 2008, 2 women on horseback raised a few eyebrows.

#### A bit of a trek...diary of a ride

My sister Bridget and I decided to ride our horses from my home in Northallerton North Yorkshire to her home in near Kendal, Cumbria. I have recently been reunited with my Fell, Winton Beck Bob whom I bred 18 years ago. He is by Tarnmoor Prince out of Bluecaster Bridie and had been leading a varied life including a successful WHP campaign, pony club, driving, dressage and endurance "down south", but an allergy to ticks resulted in a return to the north. He may

have opted for the ticks if he had known what was in store! Bridget would be on Hope, a 5 year old Appaloosa X New Forest that she has backed for western riding. Bob and Hope (yes OK, Bob Hope!) were not the greatest of mates on first meeting but became best buddies by the time we were done. Our plan was to use as many bridleways and off road routes as possible to meander across the North Pennines and raise some money for The Great North Air Ambulance.

Day 1. Brompton - Gilling West (20 miles)

With plenty of fluorescent gear and bulging saddle bags

we were ready. Everyone wished us well and we were impatient to be off. Bob was on a mission and was oblivious to Hope who had initial major concerns over carrying a very rattly collecting tin. A major part of the first morning took us on the same route as the Coast to Coast walk and we made slow progress as we were stopped by assorted and in the main international walkers suitably intrigued by our appearance including a couple of Canadians who thought we were the mounted police. A seasonal hail shower (in June!) dampened our spirits somewhat as did an enforced 5 mile detour later in the day when our bridleway clearly marked as such on the OS map had undergone a downgrading to a footpath. By the time we settled the horses it was 6.30 pm, and imagine our gratitude when our hosts offered us the farm pickup to drive to the village pub for our supper.
#### Day 2. Gilling West - Arkengarthdale (15 miles)

I think you can really justify a full English farmhouse breakfast when you're out in the fresh air all day and are not sure where or when your next meal will be, so we made full use of our B&B hospitality before setting out. The rain had cleared and the sun was beating down as we climbed up into the hills past firing ranges and disused lead mines. The barren landscape looked like something off the moon and Bridget thought the new stone grouse butts were the latest Andy Goldsworthy sculptures. Some bridleways are only suitable for Fell ponies, sure footed with a low centre of gravity, and some riders wouldn't dream of riding a trail which might involve them dismounting. But these high level routes were the original packhorse trails not always designed to be ridden, and we were happy to ease the load on our horses by getting off and leading them. As we scrambled down the track into Arkengarthdale, I think Hope felt she had somehow returned to her Appaloosa roots and was crossing the Rockies. As we dropped down into the village we could see the riding stables where the horses were staying just across the valley but frustratingly there was no direct route. A good hour later, after making sure the horses were settled, we trekked back on foot to our accommodation and met our hosts just as they were setting off to collect us in the car.

#### Day 3. Arkengarthdale -Winton (18 miles)

Another sunny morning, According to the OS map, there is a fantastic bridleway straight to our lunch destination at Tan Hill. Local advice tells you it turns into a bog. So we took the moor road, admired the scenery and felt like we were extras in *All Creatures Great and Small*. As usual Bob was in front, and this meant it was me who was dive bombed by indignant Lapwings protecting their nests. We met 2 women with their dog walking the Pennine Way, heading for Bowes. Their dog carried a back pack with his own provisions. Maybe we needed a packhorse.

Finally we could see the pub and enjoyed our lunch. More local warnings about bogs followed, so we stayed on the moor road and enjoyed our first views of Cumbria. That night's grazing had been arranged by our farmhouse B&B (the Marsden family in Winton) which was conveniently positioned about 50 yards from the pub.

#### Day 4. Winton - Appleby (11 miles)

We tacked up in the farmyard and Bob was much admired by Jack Marsden whom I had competed against in driving classes. Setting off again we had quiet lanes all the way. A phone call to a local farmer and we were given permission to ride across his land. Every field in the vicinity seemed to be populated by Shetland ponies, but as we progressed up the farm track we were flanked on either side by coloured cobs including a magnificent stallion which came to check us out. Hope hid behind Bob at that point. The farmer proudly showed us his fields of Trotting mares with this year's crop of foals, and over the brow of the hill tucked down by the River Eden, his practice track. On a recent trip to Australia he'd seen a training buggy which hitched behind a vehicle allowing 8 horses to be exercised at once. He came home and built one. It was doing a steady pace around the track with 8 youngsters midway through their 12km daily training. He waved us off up the lane which used to be the main entrance to the farm some time ago, and I don't think anyone had been down it since. We followed the bridleway south of the River Eden through to Great Ormside where the national cross country bridleway crosses the river. The water level was low so it was easy to cross, but impossible to get out on the other side because the current had undermined the bank. As we rode towards Appleby we were reminded that the Horse Fair had been only a couple of weeks earlier as the grazing circles were still evident on the road side where the horses had been tethered.

Day 5. Appleby-in-Westmorland (0 miles)



This was our scheduled rest day and all four of us enjoyed a lie in. The weather forecast was for heavy rain, much needed after a long drv period, but not nice for riding. We sampled the tea rooms of Appleby and watched Ascot. Every time we looked out on the horses they were either grazing or lying down. Our non horsey farming friend was surprised, he thought they would have been galloping round his field kicking up

divots and creating a crop of docks and ragwort overnight. I think we may be allowed to stay there again.

#### Day 6. Appleby - Greenholme (12 miles)

Climbing to Asby Common it was getting cold and wet and windy. We sheltered under a tree, ate our emergency chocolate rations, and double checked the map. It was not a day to get lost. Sure of our route we trekked on, past more fields of coloured cobs with stallions, through the Great Asby Scar Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty. The Café in Orton was too tempting especially when the owner suggested we could put ourselves and the horses in the barn at the back of the café and she would bring us our hot chocolate and toasted teacakes. We wondered if anyone mistook us for novel police speed cameras as we crossed the bridges over the M6 in all our fluorescent gear. We left the horses in the capable hands of Sue Millard and headed for our B&B for the night.

#### Day 7. Greenholme - Kentmere (15 miles)

Our gear had just about dried out overnight at the B&B. Sue had Ruby, her Fell pony, harnessed up in the yard when we arrived, and led us at a cracking trot in her carriage up Bretherdale where she left us to continue over Breasthigh Road. It

was steep and rocky so we adopted packhorse mode and led the horses. We dropped down sharply to the A6 and over into Longsleddale. Well named valley, lovely riding but you need a horse that does gates, there seemed to be one every 50 yards. We met the only other bridleway riders of the entire trip just before we climbed over Sadgill into Kentmere. This included a 28 year old Dales pony and Bob realised that retirement was potentially some way off! The trail into Kentmere was rideable all the way and we arrived at our friends' farm earlier than anticipated.

#### Day 8. Kentmere - Hincaster (17 miles)

Very bad forecast, heavy rain and winds, so decided on an early start. Heading south, I think the horses realised they were back on familiar territory.

Bridget and I both admitted we couldn't have had two better horses for the ride, forward going but sensible. This was Hope's first big trip and after the initial excitement she thrived on the work and coped with situations better than we could have imagined. Bob enjoyed the company and showing off his mature side which has taken 18 years to finally surface. Passing Sizergh Castle, we were looking forward to getting to our destination, and hoping the water heater was on. We passed the Hincaster village sign and on to the



reception party by the village green, a bunch of garden flowers for us and carrots for Bob and Hope. A canter across the field for the cameras, and Hope still had the energy for a playful buck.

We completed our ride on 21<sup>st</sup> June 2008 having ridden 108 miles and so far have raised £875 for The Great Northern Air Ambulance. We have not planned our next trip, but it is just a matter of time.

### **Provide State Action and Dates Show**—31 May 2008

The second Cumbria Fell and Dales Pony Show drew competitors from as far a field as Perth and Derbyshire. Organisers Hilary Fawcett and Ellen Jones were pleased with the entries, as they were up by 25% on last year. The show was held in a super flat field kindly loaned by Alan Jenkinson of Clifton. This meant that three extra rings could be accommodated and parking was plentiful for both spectators and competitors alike.

Supreme Fell Pony Champion was the stallion, Carrock I'm Yer Man, owned by Ian and Alistair Smith of Perthshire. This pony was bred by Glenis Cockbain of Keswick, and has been consistently successful, having been Supreme Champion at the Fell Pony Stallion Show twice. On his way to becoming Supreme Champion, Carrock I'm your Man won the NPS Novice Picton Ridden Fell class, The Traditional Ridden Fell Class and the Open Ridden Fell Class. This is his first season under saddle, and he was ably ridden by Chris Macmillan.

Reserve Supreme Fell Pony Champion was Brackenbank Romany bred and owned by David and Katherine Wilkinson of Flakebridge, Appleby. This pony has been consistently successful for the Wilkinsons. Her handler, Melissa Brennand is to show her in ridden classes as well.

Fell pony In Hand classes were judged by Mrs Sheila Edwards of Knock, Appleby. Mrs Edwards remarked on the quality and quantity of entries forward. The show organisers were grateful to the Fell Pony Riding Judge, Mrs Fiona Cameron, Moffat, who deputised at last minute for her mother, Mrs Sheila Clarke of East Lothian who had to go to hospital suddenly. Mrs Cameron was impressed with the quality of all of her Ridden entries. She commented, "One would come into the ring, and I thought 'That pony looks good. I think I will have my winner here.' Then another would come forward, and I thought, 'Oh no, here's my winner,' and another couple may have come forward that were just as good! Very often, the top 5 or 6 ponies in the line up were outstanding. All winners in their own right."

Prestigious National Pony Society qualifiers were held for the first time at the show. Local Exhibitor, Robert Relph Briggs from Penruddock won the Fell Pony Home Produced qualifier with Townend Fern out of a big class of 16 ponies.

A new ring for this year was the Working Hunter Pony Ring. All classes were judged by Peter Boustead from Lancaster. Deborah Chadwick's Severnvale Hector from Preston was the Fell Pony WHP Champion.

Cumbria Fell and Dales Pony Show would not have been possible without the support of two local Businesses. Paragon Veterinary Group from Newbiggin, Stainton sponsored the rosettes and sashes, and Carrs Agriculture very generously gave every class winner a bag of horse feed.

The show will remain very much in the same format for next year. The only change will be a separate junior ring hosting the young handler and junior ridden classes to ease pressure on the other ridden rings. The show remains popular as it is. The organisers hope for the same fantastic sunny day that they had this year. Next year's show date is Saturday, the 30<sup>th</sup> of May. ### **Overseas Branch News: South Germany**

This year we have been true to our main aims of presenting the Fell pony to the general public and cooperating with other Mountain and Moorland breeds.

In February, 4 Fell ponies were presented at Horse Bodensee (Lake Constance), Friedrichshafen. Unfortunately, the Pendragonar Stud's carefully rehearsed performance was not included in the official show programme. However, within the framework of the Bavarian Small Horses and Special Breeds Society, the Fells were presented to the visitors to the fair twice daily for 3 days. The indoor ring we had been allocated was far too small for the 4 ponies to do more than just walk and trot around, accompanied by a spoken commentary. On the last day, Sunday morning, the large indoor arena was made available to us and there at least, the ponies could really show their paces and they enjoyed a good gallop around. A big "Thank you" to Annette Richter and her team at Pendragonar Stud for their unbounded energy and enthusiasm in bringing the Fell pony to the people.

We have also had contact with the group of Fell Pony Friends based in North Germany, especially enjoying the show at Elbickerode on 16<sup>th</sup> August.

### **Overseas News: Fell Ponies Down Under**

On 27th October 2007, Llancloudy Fell Pony Stud and Watermark Gypsy Cobs relocated from Hill Farm, Herefordshire, England to Camlea Station, Glencoe, New South Wales, Australia.

After many meetings at Hill Farm with IRT, and Nigel Misslebrook from Chaseview Veterinary Practice who w o u l d o r g a n i z e all the quarantine testing, the date was finally confirmed for 25th October. IRT organized all transportation from Hill Farm to touchdown at the quarantine station in Sydney. Using four of John Parker's lorries to get them to Heathrow Airport, the animals would be flown with Singapore Airlines on a Cargo flight.

All the IRT staff arrived in the very early hours of Thursday morning, including the vet who would accompany the horses throughout the flight.

The transporters had arrived the night before, so it was just a matter of bringing the horses and ponies in for breakfast, a veterinary health inspection, final disinfections and the correct named and tagged head collars fitted. The loading took just under three hours and by 1 pm on 25th October, the convoy made its way out of Hill Farm.

Throughout the flight, the horses and ponies were checked every hour by one or more staff. Hay would be topped up, water buckets offered. IRT commented that this was the easiest flight of horses they have transported. Not one animal showed distress or discomfort throughout the journey.

In fact, you would never have known they were aboard the flight at all, save the grey Fell pony stallion Llancloudy Dorian who it seemed had worked out the noise of the engines and realised when either landing or take off was imminent and would call to the the crew.

On Saturday 27th October 2007, Australia saw the very first fell ponies land. It was the largest complete stud migration into the country since 1964.

Once the Sydney quarantine was complete, the horses and ponies were transported to the home farm at Glencoe. They have settled exceptionally well into their new country - Australia!

### **People and Ponies: Shadow II**

#### Anne Blackburn offers a tip for arthritic riders!

My husband and I, both in advanced 70s, are very fortunate to have Shadow II, a Kerbeck strain Fell mare (Firequest of Kerbeck x Kerbeck Night Sonnet). A truly versatile pony with an exceptional temperament, she is a willing jumper, can be ridden by small children, adults and by my arthritic self as well as giving my husband a new interest in carriage driving. She is a winner in the show ring both in hand and under saddle. An angel in the stable and easy for two geriatrics to manage.

When I became too stiff and could not get my leg over the cantle, I tried riding bareback - rather warm and slippery! After a lot of thought, I used a saddle cloth secured by a roller with D rings for the two leathers (essential to use safety stirrups because there is no stirrup bar) plus a cross country surcingle for extra security. The buckles of the leathers are lowered, so they can be easily adjusted without moving the hips (e. g. for mounting and dismounting - see photo.)

I found this arrangement a big help and at least I could ride. I do hope this may be of interest to other arthritic riders.

Shadow looks after everybody and is a true ambassador for this wonderful breed of pony.

If you are considering showing your Fell pony in a driving class, here are some thoughts to mull over before the new season starts. Assuming you've got a good, sound, fit and healthy pony whom you trust in the excitements of the show ring, you need to think about how you will present your pony to the judge.

Driving classes demand a lot of hard work, because there is not just you and the pony, but the harness and the cart to choose, to prepare and to transport. At the end of this piece you'll find a list of good books that will help you.

As a judge, I try to adhere to the old British Driving Society Guidelines for Judges and Competitors. However, they didn't discuss the niceties of Native pony turnouts.

#### 50% pony!

Half of your driving turnout is the pony. You need a good example of the breed, a pony who can give a good show and is well-mannered. "The horse or pony that goes well and that is correctly trained should always be rewarded." The other half of the turnout, though, can be crucial if you are showing in good company.

#### Turnout Style: Country, not Town

It's not usual to drive a full-maned hairy-heeled pony, like a Fell, to a town-style vehicle designed for a trimmed and plaited Hackney or TB cross. So, strictly, the painted and lined Lawton and Liverpool gigs, with patent dash and leathers, are not correct. Trade turnout is a possibility, but as it is quite specialised I'll concentrate here on private, pleasure and leisure type turnouts.

#### **Carts and Carriages**

Ideally you want an easy-to-maintain country look - varnished wood for the carriage, and plain black or brown leather on the shafts, with brass or, even better, nickel fittings. It goes without saying that the carriage must be the right size for the pony with enough shaft room for him to trot out freely without knocking his hocks on the swingletree, and the cart neither too small (tipped up) nor too tall for him (pushing down). You should feel safe and comfortable seated in it, with your legs and feet able to brace on the footboard, secure without needing to lean back on the seat's "lazyback". The vehicle should be perfectly balanced with no weight on the pony's back or belly when loaded and working, and it should be safe, sound and clean (weather conditions permitting of course!). A badly balanced or wrongly sized cart makes the pony's work harder and should place you down the line.

If you go for a good-quality make of exercise or cross country carriage it will serve you well both for daily work and the occasional show, and you'll also be able to call on its builder for maintenance every now and then. Wire-spoked "bike" wheels with pneumatic tyres are liable to collapse on sideways banks or in tight turns, so for everyday work I prefer wheels with proper spokes, and solid tyres. These also tend to ensure that the cart sits up high enough for you to be able to see

over and ahead of the pony while you're driving, which is a basic safety issue. If your carriage has lampholders, put up a traditional pair of lamps, complete with candles, unlit but with the wicks singed so that if necessary you could light them easily. If your carriage has no lampholders - and exercise carts often don't have them then there is no requirement for lamps. English law on horsedrawn vehicles on the road excuses them from carrying lamps in daylight.

#### Harness

Learn to fit your harness properly. If you don't have a local instructor who is BDS educated, read Sallie Walrond's books which have excellent illustrations. Keep the harness clean. Get your saddler to check everything for soundness, particularly the rein billets, and shorten over-long straps or provide extra keepers for flapping ends. Having been a harness maker, many of the marks I knock off as a judge are for badly fitted or dirty harness. My pet hate is cheap imported harness, which is often of such poor quality as to be dangerous. It always looks scruffy, too.

Collars need not be full neck collars, although they are traditional. They are the best choice if your carriage has chain draught to the axle. My ponies certainly appreciate their improved amount of bearing surface and the relief from the squeezing action of the breast collar. You don't *have* to go to the expense of buying one though; some carts have high trace hooks and in that case, so long as there is a swingletree, ponies work better with a breast collar. The "brollar" or French collar (*see photo*), is a topic of debate. Some ponies appear to go better in them, but I know commercial drivers who have found that cheap brollars, which don't keep the firm shape of a traditional neck collar, are worse for their horses than breast collars, particularly with axle draught, and that they don't offer any benefits. Look at the draught line of your vehicle before deciding which type of collar to use.

Carry spares for your harness: a trace, a rein, a breeching strap, a hame strap (if you use a full collar), a hoofpick, a length of strong string. Your spares should fit the pony, the harness and the carriage; they should be neatly stowed in the carriage, and clean. Your mobile phone - or money for a phone call - and a knife, should be in your pocket.

Harness should suit the type of turnout, and the metal fittings ought to match those on the cart - brass with brass, nickel with nickel. Plain black (not patent trimmed) or brown leather harness are equally acceptable with a country style turnout, and plain leather or a well fitted synthetic set for a cross country or exercise turnout; again it must be in good condition and clean. I'd rather be shown a pony in a clean, well fitted synthetic set than in a dirty or badly fitted leather one. While a good, clean, well fitted leather set should be rewarded if there is nothing else to choose between two ponies and carriages, that very rarely happens.

It's more important that the overall picture is of a sound, fit, well trained and typical Fell pony being given his best chance to perform well.

We tried many activities together over the years, from endurance riding to hunting, and always came home from shows with a rosette. He loved jumping, but sometimes his sense of humour would take over and he'd duck round the side of jumps, often leaving me to clear them solo.



He was safe and kind with novice riders, and taught many people over the years, including young children. With less novice riders, he was happy to remind them occasionally who was in charge.

As he grew older, he developed multiple limb arthritis, but this didn't stop him from enjoying life to the full. He would bring himself in and out of the field, stopping en route for a cheeky mouthful of haylage, and still enjoyed gentle hacks and in hand walks.

He was a very healthy pony, and no-one could ever believe how old he was - he was still winning in hand veteran classes up to the summer of 2007. In December 2007, he suffered a bad bout of colic, and the vet confirmed a torsion. He was too old to have surgery, so I made the heart breaking decision to have him put to sleep, the end of our 22 year partnership. I hope I'll go on to have other horses, but he will always be my special one, never to be replaced.
