Chairman's Report

Thanks also go to Mr and Mrs B. Mallinson (Hardendale stud), Mr and Mrs D. Wilkinson (Brackenbank stud) and Mr K. Turner (Greenrivers stud) who entertained those taking part in the 'Learning with Fells' scheme and thus helped the Society achieve one of its aims to "promote and advance the education of the public in all matters relating to the Fell Pony Breed".

Council Meetings have returned to face to face meetings but now have the facility for members to attend by Zoom. Hopefully this will encourage those interested from further afield than Cumbria to stand for election. I am pleased to inform you of FPS Council member, Tom Lloyd of Fell Pony Adventures, involvement in an ambitious

new proposal to create a large-scale piece of land art in the Lune Gorge, near Tebay, depicting the native semi-feral Fell pony. The project called EPONA, after the Celtic and Roman goddess, is a 21st century and Cumbria-styled version of the famous chalk white horses seen elsewhere in the UK.

The intention of the project would see an image of the Fell Pony recreated in a material in keeping with the natural area. The site identified is close to a Roman cavalry fort, highlighting how ponies have been an important part of the local landscape for centuries.

It is hoped that this will be a fitting tribute and welcome to the region, an iconic work of land art celebrating the ponies and the area.

The Fell pony will symbolise the freedom of the fells and the importance of our natural environment.

Secretary & Treasurer's Report

As I write this report we are into Autumn. Hopefully we will enjoy some dryer weather to take us into the Winter. Our thoughts are with Fell pony owners throughout the world that have been affected by extreme weather conditions this year. Judging from Social Media our ponies have been as busy as ever this year. Don't be afraid to post whatever you do with your Fell pony, it's great for everyone to see and promotes our breed as the versatile pony that it is.

Our Stallion Show and Breed Show were well supported by exhibitors and spectators/visitors at both events. I would like to thank Judy Fairburn for her work as Show Secretary since 2019 and who has now retired from the position. Lara Kneale has taken over and will be Show Secretary for the Stallion and Breed Shows from 2025.

Many thanks to the Horserace Betting Levy Board for receipt of the Rare Breeds grant. Some additional funding received this year will again be used for the voluntary DNA testing of filly foals born in 2025. Further details will be on the website in due course.

Thank you also to His Majesty The King, for his donation sent together with his warmest wishes for the forthcoming year. I was delighted to receive a letter from Buckingham Palace regarding the review of Patronages of the Late Queen. Following the thorough analysis of over 1000 organisations, it was confirmed that His Majesty would be delighted to accept the Patronage of The Fell Pony Society. The announcement marked the first anniversary of Their Majesties' Coronation.

Membership for 2024 is at just under 1200. We are delighted to have processed many new memberships, some coming back to us after a break and some completely new members. We also have new memberships waiting to be processed for 2025.

We are happy to take renewal payments from November to avoid the January rush. If you wish to set up a Standing Order to pay your membership, make sure this is done in time for renewal date of 1 January and if you already pay by Standing Order please don't forget to update the amount before it leaves your account. The Society does not take card payments, therefore payments cannot be taken over the phone, but instead you can send a cheque/PO made payable to 'The Fell Pony Society' or pay by bank transfer (please ensure your name is used as the reference). Please try not to phone for these details as they are in the magazine (*p10*) and on the Society's website.

As well as membership fees increase from 2025, there are some other increases that come into effect from 1 January 2025, so please familiarize yourself with them before sending payments (*p11*).

We have now returned to using the email - secretary@fellponysociety.org - the gmail one is no longer used.

I'd like to thank President, Barbara Bell, and Chairman, Peter Boustead, as well as Council for their continued support; also thanks to my colleagues Val, Chris and Elizabeth.

From the Office - we're here to help

- Registration / Passport application forms cannot be downloaded from the website, they are only available by applying to the office. Do not photocopy the form. We are receiving a number of forms where the description is very difficult to read and the location of the chip has not been recorded by the vet. Occasionally the vet has not

included a stamp. The description must be printed in block letters. All whorls must be recorded in black ink and all white to be recorded in red ink. Please read the guidance notes carefully prior to completion of the forms and check before sending in to the Society. Any forms incomplete or incorrectly completed will be returned.

- FIS sample packets - Please make sure that the full registered name with correct spelling is recorded (stable/pet names are not acceptable). The results are issued directly from the lab to the owner, by email. An email address must be provided on the packet for receipt of the results. Results will not be sent by post, in the absence of an email address, the result will be issued to the vet named on the packet label. Please make sure your email is legible, if the lab cannot read your email address it will cause delays in you receiving the result.
- The current Equine Identification Regulations require the applications for foal passports to arrive with the Society within 6 months of birth or 30 November whichever is the later. However, in addition to the above, FPS regulations require applications to be received by no later than 31 December (irrespective of age) or the application will be treated as late and will require late registration fees and confirmation of the sire and dam by DNA. Double fees may also apply if applications are received during December.
- Late receipt or absence of a Covering Certificate - If service books or online notifications are received after 31 December in the year of covering then any resulting offspring will have to be DNA typed to confirm the sire. Each year the Society receives a number of passport applications for foals and there are no service details recorded for the mare. Stallion owners please be responsible and complete the service details for both your own mares and those owned by someone else. DNA typing is costly not only for the testing but for a vet to take the sample.
- Service books are not issued automatically, so if you need a book you must request one. Service certificates / notifications of coverings online must be notified by 31 December in the year of covering, if not any resulting foal will have to be DNA typed to confirm the sire prior to registration. If you choose to input the details online you will receive an email acknowledging the successful receipt. If you don't receive an email the information has not been received and you should contact the Society without delay.
- When completing stallion service certificates please complete all the details fully, including full name and registration number of stallion and mare and full dates of covering to include at least month and year. Month on its own with no year is unacceptable.
- Any Changes to a passport should in the first instance be notified to the Fell Pony Society. Please do not notify the Central Equine Database; the Society will do this once the changes have been verified. For example:
 - change of address/contact details of the current owner,
 - castration
 - notification of death
 - change of ownership
 - change in 'food chain status'.

If you are unsure of the procedure then please ask.

- Payments by BACS - please always include your name (even if it's just your surname) as the reference, when sending payments this way. The bank details can be found on the website and in the magazine, usually around page 10!

- Postage - Please do not send items to the FPS by using an old stamp (ie without the barcode). The Society incurs extra costs to receive any mail sent with either incorrect postage or old stamps which became invalid in July 2023. This cost will be reclaimed from the sender or item returned to sender by the Post office.
- Transfer of Ownership - Please always complete the vendor section on the transfer form when you hand over the passport at the point of sale of a pony. This will help both the purchaser and FPS process the transfer and update the passport quickly. Vendors should also complete the details on the tear off slip, detach and send to the FPS; this can either be posted, or photographed or scanned to send by email. Horse Passport Legislation will soon be changing to include the responsibility of the vendor/ seller to notify PIO's of a change in ownership, so now is the time to start doing this before it becomes legislation.

During busy times and during periods of staff holiday and sickness please be patient, we will do our best to send out paperwork and return passports, reply to emails and phone messages within the usual time frame but there will be inevitable delays. We will try to advise of these periods on the website and FB page.

Increase in Postage Costs

In an attempt to reduce our postage costs, we will no longer be sending out cheques for payments made from the HBLB Grant. With effect from 1 January 2025, payments will only be made by bank transfer.

If you haven't returned your form providing us with your bank details, then do so now. If bank details are not provided, then the Grant amount due to you will be treated as a donation to the FPS.

Members agreed at the AGM that the subscription fees should be increased from 2025 to ensure that they continue to receive both a Spring and Autumn Magazine through the post.

If you pay by Standing order, please remember to update the amount before it leaves your account on 1 January (*see page 10 for bank details and page 11 for new subscription rates*).

If you normally receive more than one magazine per household eg family membership and you are happy to just receive the one copy, then please drop us an email and we'll add you to the list.

All items of post will be sent 2nd class or Tracked 48 (and overseas, with proof of postage only).

If the FPS is requested to send an item of post 1st class (or Special Delivery) or overseas with tracking, then the additional postage will need to be paid for.

The range of overseas membership types mirrors the UK types, with an additional charge to cover the cost of overseas postage.

An associate member is unlikely to own a pony and therefore will not wish to take advantage of the pony related privileges of membership.

Family membership may be applied for by married or co-habiting couples and their children under the age of 18 years, all residing at the same address. The two adult members enjoy the rights and privileges of full membership, and the children the rights and privileges of junior membership.

Full details are in section 2 of the Articles of Association. Please note that Family membership does not apply to adult couples without children; in these cases the membership is for 2 Full memberships (separate membership forms required).

Membership Renewal

Society memberships fall due on 1 January annually. **PLEASE NOTE the increases in membership fees**, shown above, which were approved by a vote at the AGM in April (*see the AGM Minutes on p18*).

No member is entitled to vote for the election of Council if his/her subscription to the Society has not been paid on or before 15 February of the current year, or to vote at an EGM / AGM, if his/her subscription has not been paid by the date of the meeting. Please have your membership card ready to show on arrival.

If subscriptions have not been received by the time we send out the Spring Magazine, a reminder slip is enclosed with it. Alternatively, members can arrange to pay their subscription by standing order on 1 January each year; or pay by bank transfer.

If either the FIS test or DNA typing has **not been done through the FPS then a letter will also be required from the vet who took the sample, confirming that the identity of the pony was checked.

Information for EU owners and breeders

Breeders in the EU are encouraged to ‘register’ their foals with the Fell Pony Society once the passport has been issued in their home country. The FPS can issue the non statutory pages normally included in the FPS passports. These pages will be issued as a separate document, providing the passport has been issued as per the FPS regulations, and this would confirm registration in the FPS Stud Book.

NB the entry can only be added to the FPS Stud book providing the application is as per the FPS rules.

There should be no need for DNA typing providing the passport has been issued in the year of birth.

Fell Ponies **will not** be included in the UK Grassroots online unless they are first ‘registered’ in the FPS Stud book.

The Society can:

- issue stallion licences, stallion service books and accept service details online. Please also note that applications for a FPS stallion licence can *usually* only be considered for ponies already registered with the FPS or NFPS. Please check with the FPS.
- Process applications and renewals for FPS membership
- issue FIS test kits and DNA test kits
- issue prefix applications to register a prefix with the Central prefix register in the UK.

Editorial

At the time of writing, there are sheep sales preparations going on at every farm around me, and no doubt Fell pony sales prep as well, with foals being weaned and handled ready for the auction at the end of the month.

Despite sitting indoors here in front of the computer, I feel I am at one with my busy neighbours - I too am "gathering" - collecting my emails and social media messages containing Magazine material, and "shedding" them into appropriate "pens" ready for publication.

Currently there are 207 emails in my Autumn 2024 folder; do you think that would be a herd, or a flock? The numbers seem to increase every time I go and look! Thank you all for sending me so much interesting material, and thanks for sending your stories and beautiful photographs in formats that are (mostly) easy to work with. Do include your name on your writing though - don't be shy!

Information

I have written a few pieces myself for this issue, but I have spent rather more time this year helping other people to write about Fell ponies for other publications. That involves trying to inform them as well as I can, on behalf of the Society, so that what they publish about our breed doesn't contradict the Society's educational material. Although updating someone's web site costs almost nothing, correcting already-printed books is expensive; so it saves a writer time and money if they get their information about Fells from the Society, rather than from a web search engine.

Leaflets

On the topic of printed material, I daresay we shall soon have to update the FPS three-fold leaflets about the Society and the ponies. In May this year, King Charles graciously became our new Patron, following the 40-year patronage of the late Queen, and we really must update our publicity material to show his generous acknowledgement of our breed society.

FPS web site

As webmaster, I have been busy housekeeping: removing ancient copies of the Breed Description and Scale of Points from the FPS web site. I had not realised how many hoary-whiskered versions of these were still hiding in the deepest cupboards of the site! Google knew about them, though, and it has been blandly offering them to those people who don't bother to visit the FPS web site directly but prefer to "google it" (for "Google" in this piece please read Google, YouTube, Amazon, Bing, DuckDuckGo, *ad nauseam*).

However, I have now scrubbed the site's cupboards bare and all the files on the server are up to date... I think. Let me know if you find any old ones.

Searching the web site

The search engines may still try to send you to the deleted files for a while, so I've asked the server host to point you to an FPS "404 Page Not Found" page that has links to our Home page and to the Search function, until Google's "crawler bots" sort themselves out and direct you to the correct files.

But why not make life easier for yourself in the first place! Whether you want information about the ponies, the Society, the breed's history, welfare issues, showing, conservation or what-have-you, just go straight to the FPS web site

<https://www.fellponysociety.org.uk>, and use the Menu, then Google can't misdirect you.

There's a comprehensive Menu and a Search function on the FPS site, and between them they will provide you with correct information.

I should mention that the Search function on the FPS web site will not connect you to any pedigree data. The pony pedigree database is stored by Grassroots, and only FPS members get a pass code for it. So, I am guessing that all those searches for pony names, which I see in the search reports each week, must be from non-members... if any of those are your friends, please encourage them to join the FPS! Then they can access Grassroots to find out what they want to know.

About the Society

"What is the FPS? What does it do?"

The Display Team are often asked this when attending country shows - and sometimes even, "How do I know you are 'the real' Fell Pony Society?" - ! - so I collated a list to help the Team when they are talking to members of the public. The deadline for sending me material for the Spring 2025 issue of the Magazine is 1st February.



For several years we have made the Agenda of each upcoming Council meeting available on the Society's web site. We are now putting summaries of Council Minutes online as well.

The Agenda and Summaries can be found via links on the About The Society page. Summaries are being published 2 meetings in arrears, ie, after matters have been discussed and after the minutes of that meeting have been approved by Council at a subsequent meeting.



Betty Wilson Walker, 22 August 1930 – 23 March 2024

Betty was born in Northumberland but brought up in Borrowdale, and for most of her life she lived at Ellers, Grange in Borrowdale, below Maiden Moor in the Lake District.

I first met Betty in the summer of 1968 when my mother treated me to two half-day rides with Peter & Edith Robinson's Lakeland Trekking. I can date my allegiance to the Fell pony breed to those two rides. Betty was their trek leader, and her mount was Peter's Fell gelding, Sleddale Angus, of whom she painted a superb portrait which hung for many years in Peter's sitting room.

Angus was over-height, mahogany-bay, and as macho as any late-cut stallion can be, but Betty referred to him as "Gussie" much to Peter's disgust.

She spent a good deal of my first ride educating me (as she did with everybody) about the Fell pony breed and its hardiness and thriftiness and ability to survive running wild on the fells. On my second visit, Betty had a cold, and disastrously lost her voice, which usually bossed a dozen riders and ponies with no effort. She mounted me on the other Fell in the string, Wimpsey, which put me at the right height to receive her hissed orders and relay them to the rest of the trek.

I worked beside Betty for 4 summers at the Robinsons' new location at Troutbeck Hotel on the A66, with an assortment of Fells, Highlands and Icelandics. She commanded the treks wearing a battered velvet riding cap, an ancient walking jacket, and wellington boots. I never saw her ride wearing gloves, nor carrying a commercial riding crop - she preferred a stick from the hedge. Her "afters" at lunch at Troutbeck always consisted of a "sugar butty". She was sometimes not easy to get along with,



but she sent me a Christmas card almost every year, and in more recent times kept up with technology by getting a neighbour to send an email on her behalf.

She had been called a "slow starter" at school, possibly because it did not teach any science that would have engaged her mind, but in her forties she achieved a degree through the newly created Open University.

Betty was brisk, precise, strong-willed, and famously frugal: during the hard winter of 2010-2011, when she was over 80, her sole means of heating her house was a one-bar electric fire of dubious efficiency, so her water supply froze. She didn't seem to think that either fact was much of an inconvenience.

Betty's Fell ponies included Dent Destiny (not a typo for "Dene"), Greenholme Copper, Midnight of Manesty, and Galliard of Manesty (*left*) who was an orphaned Heltondale foal known as "Nicky". I remember seeing her showing him at Dalemain in harness.

The 1980 Fell Pony News reported:

“The record entry of driving turnouts at the 1979 Northern Driving Championship Show included four Fells who acquitted themselves very creditably and collected a total of eight rosettes and a cup. They were Mr. Lloyd Ousby’s Bushby Briar driven to a Ralli car, Miss Betty Walker’s Galliard of Manesty driven to a Rivington gig, Miss Jane Brindley’s Edenview Moonstroller driven to a Ralli car, and Mr. Clive Richardson’s Border Black Empress driven to a well-bottom gig and a governess car. A notable achievement was that of Miss Betty Walker who drove her pony from Keswick to the showfield at Kendal the day before the show and drove him home again the day after the show. Considering that the pony had only been in harness a few months, the exercise verified the sensible nature of the Fell and proved an extremely enjoyable and unique journey.”

Betty served on the FPS Council for 36 years and for much of that time she managed and distributed the Society’s stallion service books and represented the FPS at National Pony Society meetings in London. Her knowledge of the stud book was extensive: she, Molly Laing and Peggy Crossland were the Grassroots database of their time, before Clive Richardson produced the “black stud book” for the Society.

Competitors will remember Betty issuing their numbers at the Breed show, but only *after* their ponies had been measured in.

She wrote to the Duke of Edinburgh in the early 1980s to suggest that he might become the FPS Patron; in his reply he explained that he must refuse, but only because the Queen herself was very interested and wanted to take on the role! Betty was very proud of having prompted this patronage.

Betty’s hand-written progeny analyses of the most prolific stallions of her generation were detailed and exhaustive. I wish I could have included them in *A Century of Fells*, but there was no way to print their arm’s-width scroll of extended pedigree data without making her tiny writing so small as to need a microscope to read it. However, her study on *Colour and Markings in Fell Ponies* is still available online in the FPS web site back-numbers of Magazines (Volume 6a, 1984).

Betty was an artist, a cellist and a singer, a staunch believer and warden at her local church, and she wrote a small book about old Cumbrian churches including St Kentigern’s at Crosthwaite.

Betty was an enthusiastic aunt, great-aunt and great-great-aunt to her older sister Mary’s family. Mary had attained the age of 94 and Betty had hopes of exceeding that, although sadly it was not to be. However, with the support of the Borrowdale community she was able to live alone at Ellers until almost the final day of her life.

In 2017, the FPS Council proposed that Betty Walker should be made an honorary life member of the Society, in recognition of her long term support and work for the Fell Pony breed. When this was ratified at the AGM, “Miss Walker thanked everyone and said that she had enjoyed every minute of it.”

1 Apologies for absence

2 Approval and adoption of the Annual General Meeting Minutes of 1 April 2023

Mr Boustead asked for a proposer and seconder for approval of the minutes published in the Autumn Magazine. Acceptance of the minutes was proposed by Mrs Slack and seconded by Mrs Charlton and approved by members.

3 Matters arising from the minutes of the Annual General Meeting 2023

Mr Brunskill said that not everything was recorded. Members agreed that only a summary should be recorded and members were reminded that a draft of the minutes was approved by Council in September 2023 prior to their inclusion for members' approval in the Autumn magazine.

4 Chairman's Report

Mr Boustead thanked members for attending despite Storm Kathleen, the 11th reported storm this year!

He reported that the FPS is the most pro-active Society with a magazine second to none. It's refreshing to see the variety of activities. The ponies are so much more to owners than showing. The LWF scheme open to adults and children has received a good response this year. The Display Team continue to provide education to the general public at events. The FPS probationer Judges Scheme has been running for several decades. Native Pony Roadshows, along with other native breeds, explain the type and conformation. Epona - land art of a Fell pony in the Lune Gorge below the Howgills: the official launch of the project to held at Rheged later in the Spring. Challenges - 100 miles, 96 Miles and a new one for 2024.

How much pleasure the Fell Pony gives can be seen throughout Social Media by everyone worldwide. Mr Boustead reminded members how important it is to promote the pleasure people get, whatever the activity.

Mr Boustead thanked all those members and volunteers of sub committees, fellow Council members, and particularly Mr Metcalfe, who has retired from Council after 25 years, and for the last 6 years as Vice Chairman. He also thanked Miss Bell, President, and the FPS Office staff. He reminded members that Council make the rules and the office implement them.

Office Assistant Val will be running in this year's London Marathon in aid of World Horse Welfare, and donations can be left at the AGM or via Val's Just Giving page.

5 Secretary/Treasurer's Report

Mrs Wilkinson opened her report by saying that now we're in April it is hoped that we can enjoy some better weather, and that it's certainly been a testing few months over winter particularly when it followed a wet summer.

Those who enjoyed taking part in last year's challenge will I'm sure also look forward to beginning the new challenge for 2024. The creation of our area support groups was instigated by Mary Longsdon 25 years ago, and this year the groups will be arranging events to celebrate this milestone of promoting and enjoying our Fell Ponies.

Many other events, shows and promotional activities are already listed on the website's 'Events Calendar'.

Registrations for 2023 are now complete. We are working on the stud book which will be available at the Stallion Show. Total Registrations for 2023 are 311, (321 in 2022) plus 37 ponies registered by the Dutch Society (38 in 2022). The number of foals registered to the Hill bred herds, as agreed by Council, was 107, (35% of the total registered), 13 less than in 2022, which was largely due to there being no Wellbrow foals born in 2023.

There are currently 921 members who have renewed their membership for 2024. A reminder in the magazine for outstanding membership fees has resulted in a steady flow of payments coming in over the last few weeks. Around 300 who were members last year have still to renew and there have been 97 new members so far in 2024.

599 were eligible to vote for Council election. Disappointingly again, only 137 voting papers were returned (23% of those eligible bothered to vote).

Schedules and entry forms for the Stallion Show, South Cumbria Show and the Breed Show are available today and are available to download from our website. The HOYS qualifier will be held at the Stallion Show in May.

The Learning with Fells Scheme will be available this year. There are already some names forward but there is still time for members to put their names down, and we will be agreeing dates for visits soon.

In March the Society submitted the annual return to The Horserace Betting Levy. We look forward to receiving the grant in due course and are very grateful for this.

The Society is delighted to receive a donation from His Majesty The King, for which we are very grateful.

Mrs Wilkinson reported on the accounts included in the Spring magazine. They are showing a loss in the last financial year. However, if the upkeep of the pony is taken out (£10,705 less £6000 legacy received for this purpose), this leaves a profit of £670.

The Society continues to pay for the upkeep of 1 pony, (now aged 22), from the funds issued in 2018. Initially Council believed that the £100k legacy was for the Society's use and that additional funds required for the upkeep of the ponies would be sent through as

required, from the discretionary trust, which indeed it was, until a change in personnel at the solicitors, in 2023, advised the Society that the purpose of the legacy, received in 2018, is for contributing to the care of the two Fell ponies. The restriction on the funds (as shown in the accounts) is limited to the care of the one remaining pony and, on its death, the balance will be transferred to the charity's unrestricted funds to use towards its charitable purpose.

Finally Mrs Wilkinson thanked Council and our President, Barbara Bell, for their continued support and also she thanked Paul Metcalfe for his support whilst on Council. Thanks go to the office team, Chris, Elizabeth and Val, who do their best to cover for her whilst she is away from the office.

6 Election of Council

Mr Boustead reported that there had been 5 candidates for 4 places. The scrutineer, Mr G Johnson, reported that 137 valid voting papers were returned. In addition there were 2 spoilt papers, no names provided.

Mr B Mallinson, Mr W S Potter, Miss C Simpson and Mr K Turner were duly elected. Mr Boustead thanked unsuccessful candidate Miss D Meikle for her interest in standing for Council.

7 Adoption of Accounts for year ended 31 October 2023

Adoption of the accounts was proposed by Dr Whitley, seconded by Mr Greener and agreed by members.

8 Resolution to appoint Dodd & Co as Accountants to the Society

The resolution was proposed by Miss Simpson, seconded by Mr Mallinson and agreed by the members.

9 Reports from Sub-Committees

Conservation Grazing - Lowther Estate has purchased a small herd of Fell Pony mares. They also have Konik ponies and will be observing and comparing the 2 breeds.

Nicola Evans is to provide advice in response to a request from a practical conservation trainee from Derbyshire.

The survey which ran for 12 months gathered information from those who run ponies on the open fells (common land) as well as enclosed land - allotments, conservation grazing, lower land grazing eg salt marshes etc.

Display Team - Various events to be attended throughout the year, including 2 days at the Westmorland County Show in September. A request for additional team members (with or without a pony) and ground crew received a good response.

Overseas committee - Mrs Millard reported the following -

Reports from the US, Sweden and Denmark have been received and all show owners enjoying their ponies and how versatile the breed is.

Accounts have been received from Overseas Branches: FPSNA, Conservancy of America, and Sweden; and it has been recommended to Council that their certificates are renewed for the coming year.

Judges Committee - Mrs Charlton reported on behalf of Mrs Grealish. The Probationer Judges Scheme continues to draw a range of high calibre applicants from across the country. Mr K Turner has been added to the FPS Judges list following completion of his probationer training. Following last year's Assessment day, held at Rest Harrow EC near Kirkby Lonsdale, 3 new trainees were added to the scheme from 2024. She thanked those

who took part in the scheme, the senior judges who assess and educate our probationers and also those who provide the ponies for the assessment day.

The next assessment day will be held in 2025. Anyone wanting further information on the scheme or would like to apply please see the FPS website for details.

Show Committee - Miss Fairburn reminded members that schedules for the forthcoming shows were available at the AGM and to download. The HOYS qualifier will again be held at the Stallion Show in May. She said that sponsorship would be welcome and that stewards were required for a variety of jobs in return for free entry to the show, refreshments and a gift. Anyone interested in sponsoring either the Stallion or Breed Show to speak with either Judy or Katherine. Lara Kneale has agreed to take over as the Show Secretary following this year's Breed Show and Jean Ward will be assisting Margaret Murray with the trophies.

Scotland - It was reported that distance is a problem for many members to attend events. It's a challenge but the group will keep trying to put on interesting events/gatherings/social events.

2024 Challenge - Mrs Rawden reported that the committee had recently discussed the forthcoming challenge to tie in with the 25 years of area groups. The challenge will be to lead, ride or drive 25 miles together with a fun bingo capturing photos to make up the name "regional groups". Details on the FB page/FPS website, or from your area group rep. Overseas members to contact Michael Goddard in the first instance.

10 Any Other Business

i) The following Question had been submitted to Council for discussion at the AGM:

"Please explain the purpose and finances of the Display Team? Nothing seems to be entered in the FPS accounts. How are the expenses met, ie equipment & replacement, travel, accommodation etc? or income; from appearances? Bucket collections?

"It seems they only go to local shows where the public have chances to see and understand the value of Fell Ponies.

"Why not offer displays and entertainment further afield to County Shows, where larger fees would be available to main ring entertainment and many more gate entries would mean a larger non-fell audience to educate?!"

Mrs Robinson read out a comprehensive response prepared by the Display Team (*see page 78*). It was agreed that this should be sent to the person who raised the Q's.

Mrs L Robinson proposed and Dr Whitley seconded a vote of thanks to the Display Team.

ii) There was some discussion about providing financial support to the Area groups/ Display Team. Members were reminded that at the onset all groups were provided with an agreed sum to help them get established and these payments have now been repaid. The groups are generally self-sufficient and most forward a payment annually to the FPS for either show sponsorship or assistance towards the cost of running the Stallion/Breed Show, which is very much appreciated.

iii) Issue of Magazine costs. Details including the current costs of producing the magazine and the options going forward, including reducing the issue of the magazine to include online options or replacing one issue with a brief newsletter or increasing the membership fees, were published/issued to members prior to the AGM. Some members responded prior to the AGM generally to say that they would happily accept an increase in membership in order to continue receiving the magazine twice a year. It was suggested that only 1 magazine should be sent per

household but as pointed out all members have a right to receive their own copy of the magazine; however they can opt out by notifying the FPS office. It may also be possible to use a carrier rather than Royal Mail to send the magazines out.

It was proposed by Mr Lloyd, seconded by Mrs Slack, and agreed, that membership fees should be increased by £5 from 2025.

- iv) Mrs Charlton reminded members of a new TV series starting that evening on CH4, "My Dream Farm", presented by Matt Baker and following the National Trust's selection of new tenants for a farm on the Wallington Estate in Northumberland. It will be featuring Fell ponies.
- v) Mrs Baxter told the meeting that she had lost 2 friends with whom she had spent the happiest days of her life with Fell Ponies and visiting amazing places. She said that we must not forget that Fells are special and to give them a good life.
- vi) Mrs Walker reported that in 2023 496 coverings were recorded (294 online and 202 paper service slips). 113 stallions issued with a licence are active (23%) and 28 new licences were issued in 2023.



The Fell Pony Society 51st Annual Breed Show, 4th August 2024

A good crowd of spectators joined us for the 51st Breed Show held again in the beautiful setting of Dalemain near Ullswater, Cumbria, by kind permission of the Hasell-McCosh family.

The weather was a little threatening, and nothing like the lovely day we had enjoyed at the Stallion show, but fortunately, any serious rain held off until the show had finished, and the tents had all been packed away; a massive relief as this avoided the need to have to put them all back up again at home to allow them to dry.

An early start and long journey from Dunblane proved well worthwhile for the Smith family who achieved an astonishing double with their homebred five year old mare, Bracklinn Mabel, and two year old, Bracklinn Aubrey, taking the Supreme and Reserve Supreme accolades. Both ponies were sired by the late Bracklinn Jackpot and are testament to the quality of the stock that he has left.

The Potter family's Greenholme bred ponies were to the fore in several classes, including the ridden championship, where Nicola Chippendale took the top honours with Greenholme Hot Rod who had won two ridden classes with Georgia Kirkby (16). Greenholme Ozzy won the gelding championship and stood second reserve supreme for Lesley Bamforth; and Bethany Cousins took the best three year old, and reserve champion youngstock, with the three year old Greenholme Party Girl for owner Caroline Sharpe. The Potter family themselves took the veteran in hand class with Murthwaite Westerly; and first and second places in the colt foal class.

John Cockbain won the class for mares 4-7 years and reserve champion mare with the highly successful Carrock Daenerys; and took the yearling filly class with Carrock Majestic.

Other class winners included Boutime Esther who won the mares over four years with colt foals at foot. Bert Morland's Lunesdale Burnt Sugar won the class for mares over eight years, while Sadie Ali's Heltondale Rover V won the equivalent class for geldings; Katie Raine's Lunesdale Black Ice II won the stallion progeny class.

In the youngstock classes Rainesmill Conifer won the best filly foal and best foal overall for Katie Raine; Hornigill Bonzer won the yearling colt or gelding for Stacy Longrigg; Chestermann Chopper won the two year olds for Nadia Gwynne; and Globetrotter Lancer and Mrs A Walker took the class for three year olds.

In the ridden rings, reserve champion to Greenholme Hot Rod was Juliet Huddleston's Bowins Nightingale ridden by Alex Robinson. This lovely four year old mare won the Nursery Novice and Novice mares class and had been bought as a weanling during lockdown as company for Juliet's own foal; and has surpassed all expectations in the few shows that she has attended.

The ridden class for novice stallions/geldings was won by Greenholme Mountain Warrior with Helen Hanson. Drybarrows Emilie and Anna Metcalfe won the open riding class for mares. Summerhouse Don won the veteran ridden with Rebecca Hudson.

The Traditional walk and trot class for mares went to Rundales Princess and Ann Marie Troy who also won the award for the oldest rider. Bracklinn Sam won the equivalent class for stallions/geldings with Tamara Francova.

The show schedule includes lots of different classes for youngsters of all ages and the Bell family had a super day with their homebred Lownthwaite Heidi, who picked up three trophies. Mary (9) won the young handler class; Sarah (7) won the lead rein class; and

together with Mum, Alison, the girls won joint first in the fancy dress class, judged by the Society's President, Barbara Bell was so impressed with the standard in the fancy dress class that she awarded the family's super interpretation of 'Mary Had a Little Lamb' joint first with the other entrant, Cath Wrigley's Murthwaite Ripley; who together with Emma and Ivy Wrigley (5) had transformed themselves into a brilliant version of 'The Lion, The Witch and The Wardrobe'.

2024 Southern Show Report

After a heatwave in 2023, this year the weather in the lead up to the show was more wet than dry. Fortunately we had no worries about cancelling due to ground conditions as Berkshire College of Agriculture has ample hard standing for parking, and the day itself stayed dry, albeit against a backdrop of threatening clouds.

Once again we had strong in-hand mare classes, and judge Jenny Grealish chose Lorna Brook's Knockamillie Jasmine as champion mare, with Sue Petritz's Richmond Hope as reserve.

Christ Grant judged the gelding classes, which following last year's trend had fewer entries than the mares. Where are all the geldings? Gelding champion was Rachel Douglas' Ringstone General, with reserve Daisy Payne's Roddlesworth Celebrity.

Although classes were small, it was great to have entries in all three of the youngstock classes this year. Lorna Brook's two year old filly Bracklinn Myrtle was youngstock champion for the second year running, and her home-bred yearling Hemleyhill Elizabeth was reserve. Bracklinn Myrtle went on to take the in-hand championship, with Knockamillie Jasmine reserve. The Brooks family also deserve a trophy for managing the logistics needed to get so many ponies and handlers in the rings at the right time!

Mares did well in the ridden classes. Rebecca Rawlinson's Nabside Gracie won the Novice Traditional Ridden (walk/trot only), and Paul & Jane Steeples' Greenholme Kate both Open Traditional Ridden and Ridden classes. Jennie Ibbotson's gelding Lownthwaite Skipper won the Novice Ridden.

We also had entrants in all three children's ridden classes. Leanne Harman's Severnvale June, ridden by daughter Georgie Harman, won the lead rein class, while Roddlesworth Celebrity, ridden by Freya Payne, won the 6 - 12 year old class and Emma Woodruff's Roddlesworth Harriet, ridden by Holly Watson, won the 13 - 16 year old class. Roddlesworth Harriet and Holly won the Children's Championship, with Roddlesworth Celebrity and Freya reserve.

Greenholme Kate took the ridden championship with Freya Richard's Townend Shanti as reserve. Greenholme Kate went on to take the supreme championship, with Bracklinn Myrtle as reserve.

Once again there were only a few entries forward in the working hunter pony classes, this year judged by Clare Wigley. Tabitha Bennett's Wellbrow Leonora won both the intermediate and open classes and took the championship, with novice winner Susie Dakin's Murthwaite Rosewood reserve. The dressage classes, judged by Julie Jerome, attracted good entries for the walk/trot, which was won by Susanna White's Murthwaite Ted's Lass. Lownthwaite Skipper won the Prelim, and qualified for the 2025 NPS Dressage Championships.

As usual the handy pony/horse agility course caused great amusement. It could be tackled in-hand or ridden, and Diana McGrail and Lydvale Jet swept the board in both sections. The star round however, as judged by spectators, was by three year old Georgie Harman (helped by mum Leanne) with Severnvale Ruby Rose!

Reminders about Show Turnout

Clipping, Trimming and More

Having heard some odd stories about members' show ring experiences during the recent season, it seems necessary to remind both exhibitors AND judges that there is a document on our FPS web site called "Handbook for Showing and Competing". In it, you can read the traditional turnout required for exhibiting Fell ponies in all show disciplines.

Ownership

Ponies must be registered and entered, at any show, in the name of the legal owner or lessee. All ponies must hold a valid FPS passport and be registered in the main section of the FPS Stud Book; ponies registered in section X may not be shown at Fell Pony Society, NPS, BSPS, affiliated or County shows, but may participate in Fell Pony Society performance events (eg dressage, driving, endurance, performance trials etc.) Section X ponies may compete in the Performance Awards but are not eligible to receive any of the Horserace Betting Levy Board's premiums.

Breed Description and Scale of Points

Please note that the only version of the Breed Description and Scale of Points that is current is the one on the FPS web site, here:

https://www.fellponysociety.org.uk/about_breed.htm#description - older versions of the breed description, and text copied from it, are frequently offered by search engines but they should be ignored. Go directly to the FPS web site for the most recent version.

Updates to the Rules, Regulations and Memorandum and Articles will be advised in the FPS Magazine but they are uploaded on the web site as soon as they are approved by Council and/or the Annual General Meeting.

White Markings

Note that the "permitted white markings" section was updated 2 years ago, voted on, approved and reported in the AGM Minutes in the Autumn Magazine 2022. It reads:

"A star or white above lower eye level and white below nostrils and any white on the hind leg/h hoof is acceptable.

"An excess of white markings, including flesh marks, is discouraged, ie a blaze or stripe, or white and / or flesh marks, below lower eye level and above nostrils and / or any amount of white on a front hoof or leg, but such ponies are eligible for registration in section X."

Riders' Turnout

Exhibitors and their grooms must, at all times, present themselves in the show ring neatly and smartly dressed.

Riders should be correctly attired for Ridden Mountain and Moorland classes, with a correctly fitting hard hat. (A tweed jacket and beige jodhpurs, for example, are usually recommended.) Whilst there are no written rules regarding turnout, it is generally felt that tack similar to that befitting a hunter is most suitable.

It is not appropriate to have brightly coloured brow bands, numnahs or reins. Plain leather is all that is required.

Only traditional English style riding tack is permitted. (i.e. not Western style).

Spurs or dress spurs must not be worn.

Show canes and whips are not to exceed 75cms. (30 inches)

Competitors shall not ill treat ponies at any time.

Ponies to be shown in natural state

Ponies must be shown unplaited and untrimmed, including head, mane, feather and tail, which should not have been previously plaited as the hair should be straight and silky.

No trimming, make-up, hair dyeing or extensions.

We have been told that some judges at upper levels of showing are telling Fell exhibitors that ponies' beards should be trimmed so the judge can better see the jawline. This is not traditional turnout for a Fell pony and we would encourage judges at all levels to look on the FPS web site and read the Society's Showing Handbook to make sure they understand the breed's presentation requirements.

As published in the Spring 2022 Issue of the Magazine, trimming or shaving of the sensory hairs around the mouth, nose, eyes and ears is not allowed, as it may reduce the pony's sensory ability. FPS Council agree that the welfare of the pony is paramount. Spot checks of ponies may also be done at FPS shows. FPS panel judges are expected to take relevant action if this rule is broken, eg to penalise a trimmed or shaved exhibit presented before them in the ring.

Eye make-up, hair dyeing or hair extensions are not allowed.

Clipping of winter coats on working ponies, whilst not encouraged for showing, is not debarred. However, ponies 3 years and under must not be clipped for showing.

Bridles, Halters and Biting

Stallions and colts 2 years of age and older must be adequately bitted and under the control of a handler aged 14 or over. Stallion tack is optional. Yearlings may not be shown bitted.

White rope or webbing halters may be used to show youngstock. Brood mares, geld mares and geldings may also be shown in rope or webbing halters or in a bridle.

Volunteering at a FPS Breed Show

Many of us love to show our ponies; sometimes we wonder why we do it and sometimes we can't wait for the next one. I'm told childbirth is similar! But do you ever stop to think about all the hard work that goes into making a show a success?

For about 20 years I was involved in the Southern Show and for about 10 of those I was the organiser. The meetings were great as they involved a lovely lunch but there was a lot of hard work involved. Many hands do indeed make light work.

In the last few years I have helped out at the main Breed Show in August. Initially I was helping to set up the dressage arena, and then stewarding. This year I was promoted to Chief Steward.

I have attended the Breed Show for many years, both with and without ponies, and indeed I was at the second show in 1971 when, as now, it was held at Dalemain (and it rained sideways all day). However, being a helper brings a new dimension to being there:

new friends are made and stories swapped and it gives a sense of fun and teamwork and makes for a lovely day. It really feels like you are close to the home of the ponies for the day with like minded people as well as doing your bit for our special breed.

So why am I writing this? The answer is that those of us who help at the Breed Show feel we need more helpers and the enthusiasm they bring.

We always need help setting up and it's only a couple of hours on the Saturday to do that. We have got very good at laying out the dressage arena (geometry practice!) so we did it in an hour this year, but we do need help with rings and tents, putting them up and taking them down. It would also be good to find new storage for the tents - somewhere safe, dry and vermin free.

On show day we need two stewards per ring plus someone to run errands. With four rings plus WHP and dressage that's at least 12 people. The good thing about stewarding is you can learn show craft and what the judge is looking for. If you have never stewarded before don't be afraid, as we can pair you with an experienced steward and you will learn.

We also need volunteers for other jobs on the day - and you get to have a lovely lunch with other helpers and judges.

So why not volunteer to help out next year? Drop a line to the Shows Secretary Lara Kneale (07867 663545, email: Larakneale77@gmail.com) to give her an idea about what you might be able to do, and come and join us in running any of the Society's Shows.

And who knows, perhaps we can all have a meal and catch up on the day prior to the show?

Voluntary DNA testing of filly foals to continue

Voluntary DNA testing of filly foals will be offered again from January 2025, test paid by FPS.

UK and overseas tests are done via Weatherbys where possible; USA breeders can use a lab in their own country and then be issued with a credit against future transactions once confirmation is received of the amount paid, up to a maximum of £50.

On request the DNA kit will be issued with the passport application form. The foal should be microchipped at the same time that the vet takes the hair sample. The hair sample **must** be taken by a vet.

Parentage testing to be carried out where possible.

The FPS **will not** pay for the DNA test when

- i) the foal is as a result of AI
- ii) the sire is required to be confirmed, eg, there is no service certificate or the service certificate was submitted late
- iii) it is a late registration requiring parentage testing
- iv) the passport application is received after 30 November in the year of birth.

Learning With Fells Scheme

First of all, I'd just like to thank the Fell Pony Society for running this amazing Scheme and offering me a place to take part. The information gained from the visits has been invaluable and I have learnt far more than my expectations. Thank you also to the three studs that gave up their time to accommodate us and for your hospitality.

Stud Visit Number 1 - on a pretty miserable day, we got the opportunity to visit the Hardendale Stud, kindly hosted by the Mallinson family. As the weather forecast turned out to be as predicted, with heavy rain and generally miserable, it was greatly appreciated that the ponies had been brought indoors in preparation of our visit, so that we didn't have to experience the awful weather. We were shown the mares and foals individually with Barry giving information on the background of each mare. We then saw their stallion and gelding both of which Georgina competes and in between the downpours of rain, were treated to a ridden demonstration of both ponies; as a Novice compared to a more experience pony. It was very clear that Georgina puts a lot of time and hard work into training her ponies, proven by her success, and I wish her the very best in the future. I found Barry, Tracey and Georgina all very informative and more than willing to answer any questions we had. Thank You all for an enjoyable, informative visit.

Stud Visit Number 2 - only one day after the first visit, but what a difference in the weather. The sun shone for our visit to the Brackenbank Stud, kindly hosted by the Wilkinson family. Another very informative visit, where again I learnt even more about these wonderful Fell ponies.

David showed us this year's filly foals, whom he'd brought into their stables with their Dams. He showed us how he teaches them to be tied up in the stable as well as teaching them to lead.

We were allowed to go into each stable and see the mares and foals; which had all been tied up. He then brought out a yearling filly, as a comparison to the foals and used her as a 'guinea pig' for pointing out whorls, markings etc which would be used to complete the Foal Registration Form which is used to form part of the pony's passport.

The mares and foals were then let out and we had a walk up to the area where the dams with their colt foals were kept.

David challenged us to look at the foals and put them in ranking order from what we thought of them, which foal had the best qualities. David told us which foal he had chosen and the reasons behind it; information which I personally found so valuable.

We then got to go on a short trip down the road to see their stallion, Bybeck Angelo whom I think we all fell in love with for his kind temperament and placid nature. David and Katherine, with help from their daughter Megan, were the perfect hosts and yet again, I learnt so much from our visit and found our hosts extremely knowledgeable and very happy to answer all of our questions. Thank You again to the Wilkinson family.

Stud Visit Number 3 - The Greenrivers Stud, kindly hosted by Kev Turner. Again we were blessed with a lovely dry day as we wandered around the vast areas of land that the ponies are kept on. We met Kev at one of the fields where his semi-feral herd are lucky enough to live.

Kev told us a little bit about his background and how he ended up breeding these amazing ponies. He was extremely informative - his passion for them is obvious. He was able to give us background information on each and every one of his ponies and was more than happy to answer any questions we had.

We were also lucky enough to see his beautiful stallion Wellbrow Rover. We then travelled a short distance to another of Kev's fields, where the 'more senior' mares live and got to see even more beautiful mares and foals. Again Kev was able to give information on all of these ponies and was happy to answer even more questions that we had. He talked to us about herd dynamics, which was really interesting, and we were able to witness some of the things he told us about whilst we were there. Thank you Kev.

As a 'new breeder' with my first couple of foals due next year, I found the whole 'Learning With Fells Scheme' an invaluable experience. It allowed me to see ponies kept in various different ways and gave me the opportunity to ask the experienced Breeders all of the questions I was hoping to get answers for. Learning With Fells

Greenrivers Stud

A very enjoyable and informative day, meeting Kevin Turner's ponies near Walsall.

The ponies which Kevin keeps on several different fields were shown to us, while Kevin gave an interesting background to the start up of his newly set up stud. The main bulk of the herd was running on 221 acres of rough natural grazing, which is similar to the Fell's natural terrain.

Kevin talked about his interest in Fell ponies, and how a number of breeders had helped him find suitable ponies to use as foundation stock. He told us that Peter Boustead had been particularly supportive, teaching him what best to look for in a pony's conformation.

He has set up his stud with diverse blood lines, using a number of different sources for purchasing his stock.

Kevin has used three different stallions on his mares this year: Wellbrow Rover, who had foals from for us to look at and compare, and Townend Sky Rocket, who was on loan and running with a few selected mares. Also Fellacre Hip Hip Hooray, whom we didn't visit, as he was a young colt and not used to having groups of people in his field.

We first visited a large group of mares who were running with Rover, who was bred from Heltondale Mountain Mist II whose good influence will be running through Rover and all his foals.

Wellbrow Rover is good with his mares, and waits until they call him over, a proper gentleman and a lovely stamp of pony.

We saw mares from Greenholme, Drybarrows, Murthwaite and several other breeders running with Rover and could compare different types of pony.

Two foals that Kevin liked were Greenrivers Raindance, and G. Aunt Polly (p55).

We saw a lovely little mare, Stennerskeugh Amanda May III, with her foal Greenrivers Jeremiah.

Kevin emphasised his use of a stringent worming program, and says it has paid off as his mares are still easy to get into foal well into their twenties.

He cautioned to be vigilant about liver fluke infestations as well.

We then went over to see a Townend stallion, Sky Rocket, running with some younger mares.

Kevin pointed out some conformational faults including one on an otherwise very nice mare, whose fault was her "V frame", that could be seen from the front as a shelving in from the shoulder to the ground giving the appearance of a V.

All mares had foaled, except a lovely bay mare called Murthwaite Maggie (B).



Maggie was out of Foggy Gill Prim (A) who was Champion at the breed show in 1991, as a brood mare, when she had Maggie's sister Murthwaite Brown Betty (B) as her foal at foot.

Brackenbank Stud

We were given a lovely welcome by Katherine, David and their daughter Megan, and while David was telling us about how he'd started the stud years ago, we were given flapjacks and coffee in the comfort of the barn, with a backdrop of rowdy chickens laying their eggs.



David gave a long interesting talk about the foundation of the stud, and talked knowledgeably about many aspects of pony breeding.

We then went around to their yard where Katherine told me about the awful day that the Beast from the East had hit when ponies were inside, and how it had taken a full 4 hours to dig the ponies out from the drifted snow which was up to the top of the stable doors!

We were shown three different mares and foals fastened up, showing us different types of pony and the foals they had bred. Most of the foals this year were got by resident stallion Bybeck Angelo.

The mares we were to view were:

A little bay mare by Wellbrow Lancashire lad, which had produced a very well grown filly foal: Brackenbank Ruby Red (*bottom of facing page*).

The next mare was Brackenbank Violet, who had produced a nice black filly by Applegait Indigo Archie. The third mare was Brackenbank Ebony with a colt foal by Angelo.


David haltered this foal and showed us a very clever technique of teaching a foal to lead quietly without too much fuss.

He got a long piece of rope and attached it to the halter at one end, and then made a large loop of rope to place over the foal's quarters, making sure that the rope wasn't so loose as to get its back legs caught.

He then applied steady pressure to the head and quarters, encouraging the foal to walk forwards, which was highly effective.

David also demonstrated how to quietly pick up a yearling's feet.

We went out to the allotment, and saw a number of mares, foals and youngsters.

We then all returned to the barn for more tea and cake and further discussions.





FPS members can flag their ponies for sale on the database. Use the 'Manage My Animals' option in the drop down menu, then select 'Flag animals for sale'. You need to give permission, if not already done, for potential buyers to see your address, phone number and email address. Please check with the FPS Secretary if you are unsure.

The Fell Pony Society & Conservancy of the Americas

This year the Fell Pony Society & Conservancy of America (FPS Conservancy) is celebrating two milestones - 25 years of North American Fell pony education, promotion, and conservation, and 20 years as an FPS Overseas Branch.

Breeding registered Fells in North America only began in the mid-1980s with two import breeders. By 1999, importations to North America had resulted in a fledgling nucleus of some twenty ponies and only a handful of breeders and owners. The two original importers, New Farm of Florida & Midnight Valley of Colorado, both retired inside of 10 years of tenure, leaving BroughHill/Victoria Tollman as the next oldest established breeder - and that wasn't saying much since the stud only began in 1996 with youngstock, producing its first foal in 1999.

Concerned about the future of the breed, but hungry to learn and excited about promoting Fells, a handful of green breeders wanted to create a community that would honor the traditional pony and pave a path for the future of the breed in North America.

Together in 1999, the following 8 breeders became the founding members with 15 mares and 3 stallions between them:

- Judith Bean, Maine, USA - 1 mare
- BroughHill/Victoria Tollman, North Carolina, USA - 2 mares, 2 stallions
- Erica Brunner, Ontario, CANADA - 1 mare
- Kelmscott Rare Breed Farm, Maine, USA - 1 mare
- LaurelHighland/Mary Jean Gould-Early, Pennsylvania, USA - 3 mares, 1 stallion
- MustaHevonen/Wendy Ihlant, Washington - 4 mares
- Deerstons/Joan O'Brien, Ontario, CANADA - 1 mare
- Majestic/Dan Shannahan, Ohio, USA - 2 mares

Though it was only an informal support group, and scattered coast to coast on a continent more than 3,000 miles across, The FPS Conservancy took on the ground-level task of establishing promotional material, websites, Yahoo groups, email networks, and educational materials to help properly promote the Fells as a breed in North America. The early efforts set the stage for 25 years of good stewardship, staving off early waves of mini-Friesian nonsense and a rare breed livestock group that tried to lump the Dales and Fells as a single breed; meanwhile encouraging new owners and breeders who were enthusiastic about the true pony. In the new millennium The FPS Conservancy discouraged the creation of an American registry and instead promoted that all NA Fells be registered with FPS, a decision that has held up through these two decades.

Today, the FPS Conservancy's focus remains on education, networking for breeders and owners regardless of NA affiliations, instruction on proper presentation, and preservation of traits for the traditional Fell Pony per the rules and guidelines of the Fell Pony Society, the mother registry.

The Fell Pony Conservancy has held Fell pony breed shows and Fell pony classes judged by qualified UK Fell judges. While the vast distance and smaller population makes showing difficult and not reasonable for an annual affair, to date, the FPS Conservancy has held 3 North American Nationals - once every 8 years.

This year being one of those "8-year cycles" happily coincided with the FPS's 25th anniversary of Area Support Groups, the Conservancy's 25th year of operation and its 20th year as an FPS Overseas Branch. Our 3rd North American Fell Pony Nationals took place this past June in Virginia under the umbrella of the equine conservation group, the Equus Survival Trust; and for the first time ever for FPS, as the first affiliated FPS Branch breed show anywhere. The show was open to any

registered Fell Pony. (A detailed account of class results and photos of the NA Fell Pony Nationals appears in a separate article.) A big "thank you" to our 2024 FPS Conservancy Board:

3rd North American Fell Pony Breed Championships

Under the umbrella of the Equus Survival Trust's (EST) Stewardship Awards of North America (SANA), the Fell Pony Society & Conservancy of the Americas (Fell Pony Conservancy) held its 3rd Fell Pony North American Nationals in Lexington, Virginia.

Given the expanse of North America and limited numbers of Fell ponies here, these NA Nationals are held every 8 years, the previous two being 2008 and 2016, in conjunction with the large rare breed EST SANAFest on that same cycle. EST's SANAFest was well attended, as always, with 13 different endangered breeds and nearly 80 exhibitors participating in 117 classes.

This year marked our 25th year as a Fell pony organization and our 20th year as an FPS Overseas Branch.

Whereas our past nationals have always been kindly supported by the FPS with a special rosette, this year's FPS Fell Conservancy's NA Nationals were honored to have been given a "first" for any Overseas Branch, as an FPS-affiliated Overseas Branch show.

As such, FPS provided rosettes for In-Hand Champion and Ridden Champion.

The coveted performance award for our SANA Most Versatile (MV) Fell Pony, the Wolds Songthrush rosette, was kindly donated by Liz Whitley, an FPS council member, who had been a close friend of Jane Glass (Wolds prefix).

The SANA MV award requires earning points both as an in-hand Breed entry and in at least two SANA performance classes. Drybarrows Advocate (*left*) swept the board here.

Raising Fell Ponies in North America

Back in August while visiting Cumbria with my tour group for the FPS Breed Show and all that encompasses, I had the great honor to be asked to speak at the Old Courthouse in Shap, as part of the Ruth on the Hoof Exhibit there celebrating Fell Ponies. I am thankful to both Libby Robinson of Globetrotter prefix and Janet Woods of Ralfland for coordinating that evening, and their gracious invitation.

The particular topic I had been asked to focus on that evening was how breeding Fell Ponies in North America has been influenced by Cumbrian hill breeders. Although my presentation was brief, I began to realize during the question and answer portion that there are some misconceptions about raising ponies here on the continent, and that it may behoove our hooved companions (pun intended), to clarify raising Fells here to a broader audience.

The first misunderstanding I realized is many people think of America (not so much Canada) as having extremely hot temperatures, all over the country and for longer than what actually occurs. I do understand, this is a vast country, and if one has not personally visited, it can be difficult to understand the different regions and weather patterns. And to be honest, as I said that evening, for many of us, including where I live, summer is the most challenging season for the ponies.

To clarify, no matter which region a breeder lives in here (and according to research done by a fellow North American breeder, there are 29 scientifically

recognized climate zones in NA), they are experiencing a relatively hot summer by Cumbrian standards. The majority have been experiencing temps that, in the worst of a heat wave, may top triple digits on our scale (which is near 37C), usually accompanied by some of the worst humidity you can imagine.

Equine owners here have to become very knowledgeable about what a heat index is, which combines actual temperature with humidity, and its effect on equines. There have also been more frequent droughts in parts of our country than ever before. But Fells are as adaptable as they are hardy, and it is that instinct to survive that serves them well no matter where they are.

Breeders have many options at hand to protect them from this seasonal heat; for example through use of fans, shade, shelters and plenty of fresh cool water.

What I think is most important in providing an appropriate environment for raising Fells is to live in a region here that experiences a change of seasons, including a legitimate winter, preferably with some snow. So although here in Tennessee we have a hot and humid summer, our spring, autumn and winter seasons are very similar to northern England, and yes, we even get snow.

Select areas here in the States which do not have a significant change of seasons, such as Florida or the southern portion of Texas, for example, are a more challenging region to raise Fell Ponies as they are in the UK. Overall, weather patterns have

been shifting, and what we may be experiencing in this decade could look very different in the next, no matter where you reside.

Next, one of the things that should be addressed is the importance of terrain, and how that contributes to the health and hardiness of Fell Ponies. Hill breeders have an amazing asset in the Cumbrian fells, providing some of the wildest, challenging geography to raise ponies on. What a blessing, to see them in this natural environment! And if you've seen the fells with your own eyes, and moreover, walked them on your own two feet, any North American will agree that we simply do not have comparable topography to match that here. Long time stewards of the breed here in North America encourage all new stewards to get their feet on the Cumbrian fells, and discover for themselves that regional heritage that can only be truly realized in person.

Over my 19 years of owning Fells, I have put a lot of consideration into what it means to raise them in the most appropriate environment, similar to Cumbria. This meant I even went as far as relocating my farm some 500 miles, back in 2012, to provide them with a place most suitable. And what appears to be most advantageous outside of the fells themselves, is the change in elevation accessible to the pony and how much of its life it spends traversing those changes in elevation. Meaning, a flat, level paddock, no matter the size in acres, will not provide them the same physical difficulties that traversing rolling, climbing land which they can live out on as near as possible to 24 hours every day, every season, can do. That hardiness, sure footedness and awareness of their place in nature come from developing in a habitat that is diverse, broad reaching, undulating and retains an edge of wildness.

One of the questions I was asked that evening alluded to perhaps a deliberate choice by North Americans to manipulate the breeding of ponies to suit perceived

market demand; in specific that we are focusing on ponies of at least 14HH, if not taller. I can reassuredly say that although this may be the case in other equine breeds, it is certainly not a trend any Fell Pony breeder here has ventured towards. Quite the opposite, as I have many times seen breeders stand behind our Breed Standard, and advise would-be pony owners who are searching for "14 hands or taller" that the Fell Pony may not be the breed for them!

Although America may have earned itself this jab ("bigger is better," "go big or go home," and "look what we did to the Shetland" have all been uttered upon a time), I see far more breeders here taking an active interest in mirroring their programs and breeding philosophies to replicate the true, old breed of pony just as our Society states. Our North American breed organizations encourage their members to become familiar with and abide by the breed standard for the Fell Pony.

There was concern expressed that evening that perhaps raising ponies in our vastly different geography and climate, as compared to Cumbria, might contribute to an accelerated loss of type. But I ask, is this any different than a hill bred pony being sold anywhere outside Cumbria? Do ponies raised in the south of England reflect type and quality the same as hill bred ponies? Are ponies raised anywhere going to retain the type and vigor of a hill bred pony? And if not, how long did it take before this loss of type was witnessed?

I have been told that a UK breeder once quoted potential loss of type occurring within three equine generations. I stand behind what I have believed in my entire career with this breed - that the loss of type will happen faster due to uninformed, uneducated choices excusing poor conformation, lack of proper movement, and not understanding the difference between round and flat bone, than any change in geography, no matter the country, could do.

Overall, we have been breeding Fell Ponies consistently here on the continent beginning in the mid 1990's. We began at zero, building a breed here that did not exist prior, and foal by foal, import by import, have grown our population to over 800 Fell Ponies.

We are so grateful for the co-operation of breeders in Cumbria and beyond, and the friendships that have been made over the years, who allowed quality hill bred stock to leave their homes and become the basis for the breed in North America. We've never looked back, and we continue to look forward to working with Cumbrian breeders to solidify our foundation here!

We also started Dressage last year, first of all doing a few unaffiliated ones, all of which she won. I decided to affiliate her and through the year she was placed either first or second and always getting over 65%.

She qualified for the Winter Area Festival which was slightly daunting being surrounded by large warmbloods but she held her own to gain over 63%.

During that year as we trained for shows we also completed the Queen Elizabeth 96 Miles Challenge which was wonderful to be part of.

This year we are aiming for the NPS championships and I'd love for her to qualify in Dressage again. I've had some new outfits made for the Concours d'Elegance so fingers crossed we have some success in that as well.

If you have a challenging pony, take time to understand why and help them. It's taken ten years before Freda was ready to start competing in ridden classes, but taking that time has been worth it and she is going from strength to strength.

Driving Kizzy and Nell

My Fell story started back in October 2017 when I went up to the Fell auction with my friend Helen Oram (Empire Fell ponies).

We did not go to buy, although Helen's late mother Stella looked quite disappointed when we arrived home empty handed, so we knew that in the future buying could be a possibility. Little did I realise that our wet October road trip would be the start of the Fell journey that I am now on!

In Jan 2018 a post popped up on one of the FB Fell pages of a familiar little Wellbrow filly looking for a new home, due to devastating family health problems within the family that had purchased her. I immediately messaged the owner, who remembered us because we had had a little banter with her at the ringside at the Fell sales in the previous October. She was taken by my excitement of being able to take on her Fell filly foal and she agreed to sell her to me.

So on a disgusting wet and wild day at the end of January 2018, a good friend of mine took on the task of driving my lorry up to Lancashire to pick up my very 1st Fell Pony. Close to midnight my hairy little pony arrived home - Wellbrow Kizzy. It's been a bit of a whirlwind since then!

I got her out to some shows early in 2018 where she went to the Bath and West, Royal Windsor and a couple of local shows, and she was the breed champion at the Native pony show in Wiltshire as a yearling. I showed her lightly locally as a 2 year old, but mainly concentrating on letting her grow up.

As her 3 year old birthday came I decided that she was getting a little too big for her boots. Looking to the future I was planning to take up driving, so I sent her to a good friend of mine, Barry Hook at Horse Drawn Promotions (HDP), where he paired her up with his schoolmaster for a couple of weeks and put her through her paces. Once she had done enough miles, she returned home to turn away and grow on again.

Then the dreaded Covid hit! Everything

stood still. Once we were allowed to get out and about again I decided that Kizzy had best do something, because she was a fat 4 year old on 'good southern grass', not a good mix. Her job for a couple of months was then Riding. She proved to be a level headed and sensible hack for a friend, and then again was turned out for the winter.

Now coming 5 years, she went back to driving school with Barry at HDP and boy, she told everyone about it. Cantankerous, stubborn and extremely opinionated was the update: I turned up to learn to drive and was told that she was definitely not a novice drive. Well anyone that knows me would know that that was just the challenge I was looking for. It really wasn't an easy road, but coming from never driving a pony/horse and carriage in my life, it somehow felt like second nature to me. The guys at HDP were extremely surprised with my instinct and proud of what I had started to achieve with my little Wellbrow Kizzy.

That first year we exercised round the lanes and in the very first week we home we proudly achieved our 100 miles for the 100 year centenary. "Miles make the pony" has always been my mantra as you will always get out what you put in, but alongside this I like to have purpose when doing things, so we did Pub drives, taking friends home from work in town, picking up barrels from the brewery, all sorts of things that help to create that purpose. We attended the Southern Fell Show in the autumn '22 as the only driven turnout. We were totally unprepared, but we did it. Everyone was so supportive and it was a great experience for her and us.

We ticked on over that winter and then came the next chapter of what has now become Kizzy's "thing" - British Scurry and Trials. We rocked up to Thame show expecting a training camp, but after the practice on the Saturday evening we were all part of the Show... neither she nor I had ever seen cones before! Eek! But as normal Kizzy took everything in her stride, all that hard work at shows etc paid off, and she

was a dream. We were announced in the ring commentary as "the pony that normally spends the weekends going to the pub." (see the Colour photo pages!)



Fast forward to the end of the season: we had racked up enough points at the shows we had attended to have been crowned Novice Champion. I've never been a Champion and it was such a proud moment for myself and everyone around me who had helped me and put in the hard graft. I couldn't have done it without them all.

Then our next chapter - Yep you've guessed it, I'd got the Fell bug! Bring on The Fell Auctions 2022! I saw a 2 year old filly on the Wellbrow FB page who was going to the sales, and she immediately stood out to me - Wellbrow Nell. So, on yet another wet and windy day in October off I trundled to Cumbria in the trusty old lorry.

I immediately liked Nell. I have never bought at auction, I was nervous and I had never paid so much for a pony before, but I had come with an empty lorry, the fuel was already burnt, so she WAS coming home with me!

After spending 2 weeks in the stable at home to get to know Nell, I turned her out with 3 Hereford bulls for the winter. Smelly Nelly (as she got re-named due to rolling in hot bull sh1t) - she ruled the roost within days and earned her keep by stopping the bulls fighting and getting through fences. She became quite the little celebrity in the village with her speed runs round the huge field every morning.

Come the spring as a 3 year old it will be no surprise that Nell was already booked in with Barry at HDP. I remember making the

call on the way back from the sales to tell him I had bought Kizzy's pair and he laughed and said he knew I would end up with two and he was hoping she would be easier for me than Kizzy.

Nell spent 10 days there learning the ropes before coming back to grow on again. She did nothing that year except that autumn when I thought I'd best take her to a show to see the sights, where she picked up a 3rd in a strong youngstock class. She was a bit of a handful in fairness, but a first show at 3 years old she was always going to be.

But this spring she went back to HDP and has been an absolute diamond since the day she was put back in harness. Nothing phases her, she was the fit I didn't know I needed. She has brought solace and a new found confidence to Kizzy, her partner in crime and, considering they are so different in way of going, they fit so well - even if they still only tolerate each other at the moment. They have been driving



both pairs and single since coming home in May this year. We have taken them both to all the Scurry and Trials competitions that we have attended, even being invited to go to the Isle Of Wight to compete at the country show.

Nell was even sensible enough to debut at British Scurry and Trials in July, only 8 weeks from being started, and has

continued to compete since, including some really busy shows in the South West. We have most recently debuted them as a pair at 2 shows.

What a whirlwind for a couple of Wellbrow Ponies who landed up in Wiltshire.

I am excited for the future with these two and here's to the next 20 years.

FPS Display Team

Some of the Team were still looking after the stand away up by the Countryside Arena; while our commentator was in the distant PA box, waiting for the ponies to arrive, hanging on to her mike and her script and being thankful that someone offered a bottle of water after the long walk there.

The purpose of the FPSDT is to educate, engage, and entertain the general public about Fell Ponies and promote the breed as much as we possibly can. Our displays include a historical pageant, modern day - "what can Fell ponies do", and a musical ride.

We felt that the questions asked at the AGM (*Minutes, p21*) were a little disappointing, with an underlying tone that we are not doing enough. Most of this article is the response we put together and read out then.

We are a group of people who cherish Fell ponies and we go out there trying our

hardest to promote them to whoever and wherever we can (where our finances and time allow).

The display team runs as a sub group of the Fell Pony society. We hold our own accounts, showing income and expenditure, and these accounts are submitted to the FPS yearly - this is the same as every other sub group within the society.

The team are all volunteers who dedicate their time and own resources to attend events and push the ponies to the forefront. The Fell Pony Society do not generally provide the FPSDT with any

funding to attend events. The team attend the events which we are invited to.

We are 20 like-minded volunteers, aged from late teens to 70 plus; 4 of them are Fell Pony Council members, the rest are ordinary, or rather, extraordinary members.

We do not “charge” for our performances and often receive a trade stand space in exchange for those performances. The trade stand allows us to have a presence of Fell pony related information and merchandise, as well as the ponies being on most event sites with the stand.

All FPS merchandise which is sold by the FPSDT, on behalf of the society, is entered into the FPS accounts (under merchandise sales - our sales are not split out in the accounts).

Where donations from events are received (this can include bucket donations), they are accounted for via our accounts and this money is usually put towards purchasing of equipment or event fees that may be required for us to pay.

We recently managed to purchase a team trailer to store and haul our incredible amount of kit. The team of volunteers who make up the display team do not generally receive expenses, nor do we take expenses from the accounts as a general rule (there are exceptions, like Burghley, who specifically paid for our travel expenses).

We pay for our own accommodation, fuel, food etc out of our own pockets, so this, as well as our time, can and does dictate the distance that we travel. We are happy to go further afield and have travelled to HOYS, Sandringham and Burghley, on invitation.

The events we normally attend in Cumbria are country fair type events. Visitors to these events do not generally know much (if anything) about Fell ponies, most are tourists, and we are certainly not preaching to the converted at these events.

We talk to thousands of people every year, and we are proud to have helped match people with ponies or give them more

information about the society and how to become a member. One new member or one Fell pony purchased by someone new, because of our attendance at events, is a success we like to celebrate.

A couple of years ago we tried to encourage the creation of display teams around the country to do what we are doing in their own area - 'talking ponies' and showing the versatility of the ponies to anyone that would listen; however when people realised the team was self-funded (both in time and money) there was little uptake, so we remain the sole team out there promoting the breed.

To give you a flavour about how far we do travel...

In 2022 (our busiest year because of the Centenary celebrations) the team travelled a total of 19,222.4 miles and spent a total of 274 days between us, promoting Fell ponies, on behalf of the Fell Pony Society. That equates to an average of 961.12 miles per person, and 13.7 days per person, with one individual spending 30 days on Team business (probably more) and covering 2,595 miles (again, probably more).

In 2024 we have attended Sandringham Show (stand only); Countryfest (2 days), Coniston Country Fair, Lakeland Country Fair, Black Combe Country Fair, and Westmorland County Show (2 days).

At Westmorland County, Hynholme Amber stood cheerfully in a pen beside the stand and charmed everybody, especially the groups of school children. When we we passed them later, on our way to the main arena, the children shouted her name. They know a Fell pony when they see one now!

We've been invited to several shows already for 2025.

The Fellowship

At the end of a very busy Wolsingham Show in 2023, I was sitting chatting with Fell pony friends when I was approached by two young ladies from Sunderland who wanted to have a go at British Dressage Team Quest.

Rebecca and Natalie came up with the name of 'The Fellowship' and we agreed to begin in January 2024.

We all searched for a suitable jacket in a colour that we all thought would stand out from the crowd and get us noticed on our all black, Fell pony dressage team.

We had our first team competition on 27th January 2024 at Holmside Hall Equestrian, Burnhope, where we were placed 4th so we obviously had a lot of work to do. The following week was the North East FPS Group Sunday Lunch where I asked if anyone else would like to join us.

Samantha Summers thought about it and then, after I had given her my school teacher glare (her words, not mine) reluctantly said she would. Very shortly after this Yvonne Wilkinson also agreed to come on board. This gave us a team of six riders which gave us more flexibility for people having time off for work, holidays etc.

Our fabulous six were:

Eileen Walker riding Rackwood Maggie May (Team Captain)

Rebecca Elliott riding Rackwood Bonnie Lass

Natalie Wall riding Bowthorne Maggie May

Angela Cairns riding Greenholme Gina

Samantha Summers riding Dalefoot Ripple

Yvonne Wilkinson riding Holling Brian

We all live in different parts of the North East area, most being in County Durham, so we studied the Quest venues and selected those that were within easy travelling distance with the plan to attend at least one competition a month. The BD Quest Team rules stated that the competition would run from 1st January 2024 until 31st August 2024. It took us until March to get everyone riding as those of us in the hills give our ponies a break during dark nights and frosty weather but our riders from the east coast didn't really understand what winter conditions could be like.

There were between 5 and 7 teams at most of our competitions so it took us into June before we were awarded a 1st place. It was smiles all round when the team were invited onto the podium to have our photograph taken (*see the Colour Photo Section*). The BD Team Quest uses the five highest scores from each team's competitions. The scoring is 1st = 10 points, 2nd = 9 points, 3rd = 8 points etc. The top ten teams would qualify to ride at the Regional Finals at the end of September so the pressure was on to make sure that we were in it. Each team could have four riders and the top three scores were counted. Our team was made up of who was available on the day of the competition and who was willing to travel to the venue concerned.

We used Holmside Hall Equestrian at Burnhope, RDA Unicorn at Middlesbrough and West Moor Farm Equestrian at



Longhorsley. Our last competition was on 24th August at Holmside Hall Equestrian. We needed a good result to be sure of our place in the regional finals but one of our team members became poorly after I had completed the entries. We had to compete with only three riders so all of the scores would count, but everyone rode their socks off and we did it, another 1st place, securing our place in the Regional Finals. Woohoo!

We ended the competition with a score of 47 points (3 x 1st, 1 x 2nd & 1 x 3rd) and we were placed 7th out of the 22 teams taking part. The Regional Finals were to be held on Saturday 28th September at Holmside Hall Equestrian, which was one of the venues that we had used during this competition.

The next task was to select the four riders who would represent 'The Fellowship'. We all agreed that the team should be Eileen, Rebecca, Angela and Yvonne, with Natalie and Samantha as grooms etc (*photo above*). I excitedly completed our entries and settled into enjoying the autumn shows in the weeks leading up to this very important competition.

It was decided that we should have sparkly purple and crystal brow-bands to complete our outfits so these were quickly ordered

and arrived on Wednesday 25th September, the same day as our times became available.

To our surprise the competition was to be held outdoors, with the warm-up indoors. Thursday 26th September was one of the wettest days I can remember with over 55mm of rain being recorded in our rain gauge, so we were concerned at the prospect of riding in the pouring rain but as the competition day approached, the sun was shining with no wind or rain, so the weather gods were on our side.

'The Fellowship' were all riding in the Intro section of the competition but some of the team were competing at Prelim and Novice levels, so although we had finished riding by 10.30am there was a long wait for the results being released just after 2pm.

The top three teams will go to Arena UK for the National Finals in November. Our team was placed 6th which was an excellent result for us in our first year of competing.

We were proud to be called to the podium to receive our rosettes, but Becca and Eileen were already warming up for the next competition so our photo included pony heads. We just had to be different!

The Lowther Fell Pony Herd

The late Lord Lonsdale, Hugh Cecil Lowther (1857-1944), was as famous a man in his lifetime as any of the period. Known as the Yellow Earl, famous for his exploits on field and turf, beloved by the public for his 'common touch', for his childlike zeal, for his exuberant spending, physical courage and sheer larger-than-lifeness, he was a man who embraced the joys of being alive.

In his preface to Douglas Sutherland's biography of Hugh Lonsdale, the late James Lowther (his nephew) described visiting Lowther Castle as a boy with his parents on Sundays. As well as recalling the apple jelly served on minute pieces of 'very white' bread and butter for tea and the half-a-crown he was slipped by his uncle on leaving, James wrote of the regular routine that followed lunch:

"... feeding the pigeons and the seemingly endless numbers of ponies, with all the grooms on parade."

Indeed, the fifth Earl of Lonsdale was a huge horse enthusiast. For many years, he was a master of the Cottesmore and the Quorn hunts. In the 1920s, he became a prominent racehorse owner, Royal Lancer being the 1922 winner of the St Leger in the Lowther colours. And throughout his life, he was never far from a pony.

No doubt readers of this magazine will be familiar with the history that is shared between Lowther and the Fell Pony in particular.

LORD LONSDALE ADMIRES THE FELL PONY "VERA."

Lord Lonsdale admires Fell pony "Vera"

The Yellow Earl was President of the Fell Pony Committee in 1916, and in 1922 the first President of the Fell Pony Society.

In the early 1930s he was the Society's Patron, the ponies he bred were regarded as among the best in the country, and what is now the Shop at Lowther Castle once contained stalls specifically for Fell ponies. Leading animals from the Lowther stud are recorded in the pages of the Fell Pony stud books : Shrike, Blackbird, Hoopoe, Curlew, Ouzel, Thrush, Buzzard along with the stallion Mina, many of them sired by Glengarry, others by Dalesman or Mountain Ranger; besides being regular champions they were clearly great stampers of their stock.

Then in the 1930s it all came to an end. The Yellow Earl was a big spender and the money ran out. His trustees saw to it that he left Lowther Castle for good (in 1936) and it was no doubt then that his stud was dispersed.

Although there were Fell Pony classes at the Lowther Horse Trials from the 1970s onward and of course numbers of Fells competing in those same trials (most notably in teams driven by Prince Philip), the association between Lowther and the Fell had more or less expired.

Fast forward however to 2019. Jim Lowther, the Yellow Earl's great-nephew and owner of the Lowther Estate, found

himself caught up in the increasing global anxiety about the future of farming. Like many other environmentalists and landowners across the UK, Jim had begun to comprehend the extent of the damage that successive years of intensive agricultural practices had wrought on our flora and fauna. Lowther had participated in many of these practices - and now the estate had a duty to turn the tables and attempt to restore this wonderful part of England to natural health.

Jim began a long and detailed exploration of other estates and sites where Natural Land Management - or Rewilding to some - had been implemented. The main problem to be addressed it seemed was the health of our soil. Why were so many species of insects dying out? Why were farmland birds dropping in number? What happened to dung beetles? What happened to the old hay meadow and its attendant swathes of wildflowers that coloured the landscape from spring to autumn?

Of course the solution to these many and varied problems is not simple. There are livelihoods to consider and traditions to respect. Scientifically, the interactions between all the ecosystems, from that of the marsh fritillary butterfly to that of the lapwing, are deeply and intricately interwoven. Financially as well as socially, a careful balance has to be struck. And yet the soil has become sick. How to restore it to its old bounty?

One of the principal answers to the question of the soil and its waning health seems to be large grazers. Animals with large feet, animals with cloven feet, animals who graze in a certain way, not tamping down the soil so that it cannot breathe but breaking up the sward so that dormant seeds and plants have a chance to break through.

At Lowther, these large grazers now take the shape of a sizeable herd of Longhorns; of a clutch of Tamworth pigs - and yes, you guessed it, of Fell Ponies. So it was that in May 2024, the Fell Pony made its return to Lowther.



Eight mares, most of them in foal, were bought from Bill Potter of Greenholme. On a cool, damp day, they were released onto a 300 acre patch of fell at Celleron.

As I write, five foals have joined the herd, while Matthew Kitching's and Samantha Smith's Quarry House Gay Gordon has been running with them for the summer to bring on a new crop.

It is crucial of course that the ponies have a wide area to cover. Dense numbers create poaching and erosion - the opposite of desirable. On that basis, since the ponies are grazing such a large patch, it is too early to measure their impact on the land. What we can say for certain is that other initiatives, for example the introduction of beavers on the river Lowther, have greatly improved the conditions for waders and farmland birds. Wildflowers are beginning to proliferate and this in turn is good news for insect life. A recent count showed up 101 different species of butterflies and moths, a three-fold increase on the previous year's tally. The Tamworth pigs, who have become great friends of the Fell ponies (*see p50*), snout for pignut and in doing so provoke the incidence of oak saplings.

Regenerative Farming is a knotty business, and after almost a century, the Lowther Estate is proud to be reunited with the Fell Pony and to watch the results of its genial presence upon this precious land.

Over the Sea to Skye

Twins are rarely born full-term, and rarely survive, but Laddie and Gracie, and their mother, Cracker, behaved as if it was the most ordinary thing in the world, and they developed as any foal would, a little on the small side, but smart and fast and greedy for everything. As the twins grew, their strong bond was more and more evident. They used it to full advantage, making up for their lack of opposable thumbs with two sets of teeth, which succeeded in unfastening ropes, emptying pockets and releasing gate catches.

At weaning we put Laddie and Gracie into the same stable and it took weeks of gradually extended separations to part them without trauma. By the time Laddie had to be gelded, his trip to a clean bit of paddock for the procedure was the furthest he had ever been apart from Gracie, and after the op, he struggled valiantly against the drugs to get back to her as quickly as possible. By their first birthday it was obvious that they should always be together.

I would have dearly loved to have kept them, the twins are such special ponies, but there was no place for a gelding on our smallholding, nor could I spare them the time they needed. They grew out of their little paddocks at home and I had to find a new family for them, a family who could offer them what every Fell deserves, kindness, good husbandry, fresh air and poor pasture. Hard enough doing this for individual foals, but for twins, almost impossible.

In August 2023, Libby Robinson offered a temporary grazing job for the twins in Borrowdale. Shortly before they were due to leave, I received an email from Margaret, a crofter on Skye, enquiring about the twins. I explained they were about to go to Borrowdale, and we agreed that it was impractical for Margaret to leave her farm to come all the way to see them. Just bad timing.

Grazing on the fells with the Globetrotter herd was a wonderful opportunity for Laddie and Gracie, though leaving them there nearly broke my heart. The twins, however, loved it, and the fells began to shape them, turning them from plump yearlings into beautiful youngsters, sleek and agile and clearly hardy. I couldn't get down to see them very often, especially when our next batch of foals were weaned, and I missed them dreadfully. The crofter sent photos of her wonderful farm, her daughter's lovely cob, the acres of rough grazing, the beautiful views. Kindness, good husbandry, fresh air and poor pasture...

In February this year, Margaret Macdonald came down from Syke to meet the twins. It was as if they'd known her all their lives. Gracie decided Margaret clearly belonged to her, and if Gracie's happy, Laddie's happy too. We agreed a price, and in March our (not so little) twins made the long journey from Cumbria to Skye.

We couldn't have been prouder! She shows herself beautifully and has a real buzz for being in the ring, she just loves it and is an absolute pleasure to show. Meanwhile our veteran stallion of 21 years stood 1st and Champion Veteran there, so it was a huge success for us.

Jacob also went to the VHS championship show in September at Arena UK and on his first day there he stood 1st in M&M Large Breed and gained entry to the evening performance where he stood Reserve Supreme Champion. On the second day he entered the overall supreme finals, taking

Supersizing the herd, Fell Pony fashion!

When I became aware that two Fell pony mares were looking for a retirement home, and that one of them was the dam of my own Fell pony Grahamsley Danny Boy, it was a "given" that I'd help. What I didn't realise at the start was that eventually they'd come to live with us, turning us back into a four-pony family from a two-pony one. Well, if I'm going to be honest, a sneaky little voice way down inside hinted that it might turn out that way. I whispered "shut up" and then pretended to ignore it whenever it piped up, which it did, a lot.

We'd had experience as a four-pony family, or rather as a two-pony two-horse family in the past. Most of our animals have simply turned up looking for a home, including at one point an in-foal mare who subsequently went out on loan to a highly reputable home, only to return with yet another foal at foot. Those two half-brothers lived with us until their deaths at the age of 26 and 20 respectively. The elder, Merlin, was one of the best horses I've ever known. Heck, we even relocated to a derelict property in Scotland to ensure we could keep the menagerie in a lovely country home. The ponies had stables before we had running water or heat in the house.

"No animal in need turned away," seems to be our motto. Over the years we've homed cats, dogs, ponies, the occasional hare, hedgehog, bat, or squirrel in temporary need, and (briefly) pigeons and once, a peacock. The pigeons are usually just passing through. Finally, things had settled down nicely as a two-pony, one cat, one dog household without too many interruptions. I suppose should have been aware that somewhere fate, or a recording angel, or something, was examining the records and muttering "Is that all? About time they had another. Better make it two, in fact."

After making a few enquiries to see if anyone else would like to provide a place for Foalsyke Jenny and Foalsyke April, formerly of the Grahamsley Fell Pony Stud, the inner voice grew more insistent and persuasive. "Go on, you know you want to. And you'll cope. You always do." It's not easy finding a home for retirees, as anyone who has tried will know. The world is full of horses and ponies "suitable as companions" looking for homes.

"But two more! I'm getting too old for this malarky," I protested to the inner voice. "Most of my peers are planning their next trip to the Algarve, or Saga river cruise, or contemplating a round of golf followed by an evening at a very expensive restaurant before returning to their very tidy, clean homes."

We’ve negotiated tick and midge season successfully (the worst time of year), navigated the shifting herd dynamics, avoided laminitis, to which both Danny and Jenny are prone, and coped with doubling

up on footcare, vet care, forage and everything else.

Homing the mares has been made possible by George Birrell of Kronospan Forestry generously letting us have access to several acres of open ground in the forest right next to our own property. Also, thanks to Morag McGill for hinting to George, and Ben Edmondson of Clerkhill Farm, Eskdalemuir, who let us have interim grazing while we were sorting out the new land. I’d also like to send my very best wishes to the Tacon family, especially David and Tracey, who set up the Grahamsley Stud, where the mares lived until they were nineteen.

Where we keep them is near perfect Fell Pony habitat - unimproved hill grazing within the forest, and varied terrain with lots of wild herbs such as meadowsweet, sad thistles (which they love), dandelion, yarrow, and willow (which they also love).

Now I’ve got over the shock of being a four-pony family, and organising all it entails, I’m looking forward to learning more about the new arrivals and having some fun with them next year. These two retirees give every indication of wanting to get the most from their later years, and that sounds good to me too!

The steward called us through the tunnel, big deep breath and we trotted in. Down the centre we headed, focussing on C to try our best for a straight line. As we went through each movement we knew we were getting close to our final centre line and hopefully a square halt. And that’s it, we did it, salute and breathe. Glayva had done his first posh dressage test.”

The next test was in one of the outdoor arenas with not only big flower pots but some fabulous flying (and flapping!) flags. Jane remembers, “Again we headed down the centre line and worked through each movement. A slight argument commenced as we took our 20m circle, where on the previous test we cantered before X. This time it was canter *at* X BUT Mr Glayva thought he knew best! There was literally a debate, with him saying, ‘We are meant to be cantering’ and me saying, ‘NO not yet,’ and Glayva going, ‘I’ll take this into my own hooves and take the canter NOW!’ The rest

of the test was good and again a lovely sense of achievement as we did our final halt and salute.”

The Fell ponies were well placed both individually and overall as a team. After the event, we all headed our separate ways but aiming to try to qualify and meet up again, same time, same place, next year. We had a great time, and really showed how our special breed can hold their own against the other native breeds and how Fell pony people seem to make things great fun.

Qualifiers for the NPS Championships 2025 are held all over the country; the best place to find out where they are being held is the NPS Dressage Facebook Group, which publishes regular updates as more venues are added. 
